Aloha e Chair Waters, Vice Chair Kia'āina, a me Members of the Honolulu City Council:

Hawai'i Investment Ready (HIR) supports Resolution 21-79 and an amendment to Bill 6 to allocate funding for a grant program to support local agriculture.

The COVID-19 crisis has made clear and real for us that our economy in its current form is fragile and vulnerable to external forces outside of our control. There is consensus across our sectors and communities that change is necessary and that Hawai'i is at an inflection point where the decisions we make in this moment will have generational implications. We have a unique opportunity to make decisions and critical investments today that will result in a more resilient and diversified economic future.

Resolution 21-79, introduced by Vice Chair Kia'āina, strategically positions the City to leverage its funds and contribute to a coordinated and collaborative community of stakeholders advancing local agriculture as part of our desired economic future.

HIR is in the concluding phases of the inaugural Hawai'i Capital Scan project, part of which is analyzing the efficacy of public, private and philanthropic capital investment drivers specifically for Hawai'i's food systems. Attributes such as liquidity constraints, return expectations, risk, sectors, and impact preference were collected and analyzed for insights. The report will illuminate the unique narratives Hawai'i capital movement is creating in the food systems, the thought leadership emerging in the sector, the blended capital opportunities, and noteworthy funding and data gaps.

While the report is not quite ready to be published, we can share in this testimony that the Hawai'i Capital Scan has identified opportunities and gaps in the food systems funding ecosystem. Our strong position, based on this evidence, is that the funding allocation requested by Resolution 21-79, informed by this report, will be strategic and highly leveraged. The data and insights we have gleaned from our research provide evidence that these funds will make a significant contribution in attracting, coordinating, and enabling the collaboration of other sources of philanthropic and private capital to more efficiently and

effectively invest in and scale up local agriculture to become an economic driver and resilient pillar of our economic future.

The current amendment in Bill 6 CD1 to allocate \$1M to the Office of Economic Revitalization for this effort is a good symbolic start but it is simply inadequate to meaningfully leverage and manifest the full potential of this opportunity. A \$5M allocation would exponentially increase the impact potential and role that the City would play in the economic development of this vital sector.

Furthermore, an initiative and fund for local agriculture is an area of work that is new for the City. It is understandable that venturing into unfamiliar territory warrants a cautious and perhaps "start slow" approach. Unfortunately, a cautious approach will miss the opportunity. The good news is, however, that the City will not be going alone in this work. The other stakeholders in government, the private sector and philanthropy, have been at this work for decades in the local agriculture sector. In the last year, COVID acted as a forcing function to enable these stakeholders to formalize and fund collective action initiatives. The Office of Economic Revitalization has been represented in many, if not most, of these collaborative efforts and has the relationships and trust that will enable the City to contribute in its best and most effective way while others in the system do the same.

If your vision for a resilient future for Hawai'i includes Hawai'i's ability to feed itself, then there is no better time to build on the progress made during COVID, and invest into local agriculture. The conditions for transformational collective action are here. Buy in and support from the government is essential. Let's not miss this golden opportunity.

Dear Committee on Housing and the Economy voting members,

I am writing to express support for RESOLUTION 21-79 – GRANT PROGRAM TO SUPPORT LOCAL AGRICULTURE, which urges the Mayor to establish a grant program to support local agriculture through the Office of Economic Revitalization.

I have been working in agriculture in Hawai'i for over a decade, much of that time devoted to assisting small farmers with conservation and more recently, implementing food safety practices and achieving food safety certification to allow them access to larger local markets.

These small farmers are integral to our regional supply systems, a fact which cannot be overlooked in our experiences of the past year. Many of these small and medium sized producers have interest in scaling up production but are constrained by financial challenges, especially those around aquiring new equipment, including farm implements and tractors, but also refrigerated trucks and improved, food safety compliant packing facilities. In order to be more self sufficient and less impacted by global supply chain disruptions, we must focus on identifying what our local agricultural producers need to function successfully here and act to provide them with assistance to meet those needs.

A grant program that would support local food production is much needed, particularly since many existing federal grant programs explicity prohibit purchasing machinery and funding capital improvements. It is extremely difficult to scale production without new or additional equipment to prep land, plant, harvest crop, and transport that crop safely to market. Our local producers need to have the ability to explore new technologies that will help make their farming jobs more efficient; this is an essential tool in the ability to compete successfully with larger and more inexpensive operations on the mainland.

Over the past year, my organization has facilitated two CARES Act projects that provided direct support to local producers on O'ahu (20 farmers) and Kaua'i (40 farmers) by identifying what they needed to enhance and improve their farm businesses and make it possible for them to sell product into new, larger local markets. We found that simple changes made a huge difference: funding was used to purchase food safety compliant harvest bins, sanitizer systems to provide microbially clean wash water, materials to build larger, safer packing sheds to handle bigger harvests in a food safe manner, simple technology such as laptops and financial software to manage their businesses, security cameras for their farms, and storage sheds for proper chemical

storage. These are all items that directly impact each farm's ability to grow, which in turn supports our local economy across sectors.

Hawai'i is blessed with a near year round growing season for many crops, and we also have numerous small and medium sized farms from Kaua'i to Hawai'i island. We can improve outcomes in our agriculture sector and our state economy by supporting these farmers and helping them to grow. They are already here, we don't need to import them, and a grant program to support local production is a perfect place to start.

Dear Council Members:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony. My name is Janel Yamamoto and I am the current Director of GoFarm Hawai'i. I am submitting testimony as a private citizen in <u>support</u> of Resolution 21-79, which seeks to establish a grant program to support local agriculture through the Office of Economic Revitalization.

GoFarm Hawai'i (previously named the Agribusiness Incubator Program) has been providing business consulting services to farmers throughout the state since 2003. In 2012, in response to the lack of new farmer development, a beginning farmer training program called GoFarm Hawai'i was started in Windward O'ahu. Since then, the training program has grown to include five farmer training sites across the state (two on O'ahu) and one agricultural technician training program at the Waiawa Correctional Facility. The beginning farmer training program has graduated over 400 individuals statewide since 2012 (60% of them on the island of O'ahu). Many of our graduates have started small farms or found work supporting the agricultural industry. As an extramurally funded program, GoFarm Hawai'i relies solely on grants and donations to support its work.

In 2020, GoFarm Hawai'i was the recipient of CARES Act funding through the City & County of Honolulu. The funding was vital in allowing the program to 1) support our local farmers with business assistance and 2) offer agricultural workforce development training. In the past year, GoFarm Hawai'i has seen a tremendous increase in demand for farmer training on O'ahu. For our current cohorts on the island, 234 individuals participated in our introductory session, with 103 applying for 25 openings. Since June 2020, 413 individuals have asked to be notified about our next recruitment period. With individuals currently willing to support our agricultural industry, investing in our farmers and programs that support them are critical in growing this industry and increasing our local food security. To ensure the continued growth of the local agricultural industry, and efficiency is essential.

In conclusion, I respectfully request that the Council and Mayor approve this resolution that will help build and strengthen the island's agriculture industry. Thank you for your consideration. Please contact me if you have any questions.

Dear Chair Kia'āina, Vice Chair Say, and Members of the Committee,

The East O'ahu County Farm Bureau, which represents approximately 420 farmers and supporters of agriculture from Waimanalo to Kahuku, strongly supports Resolution 21-79, which would establish a grant program to support local agriculture.

East O'ahu County's membership includes many small-to-medium-size farmers who would like to increase production, try new crops, and/or improve their farms' efficiency. Modern agriculture often requires infrastructure such as greenhouses, shade houses, drip irrigation lines, aquaculture tanks, planting and harvesting machinery, and processing, packing, and storage facilities. Farmers need to satisfy increased food safety requirements, to conserve water, to reduce fertilizer input, and to protect their crops from pests and diseases while minimizing pesticide use – all while maintaining or increasing yield and quality in order to compete in the marketplace. Farmers, especially new farmers or small-to-medium-size operations, often cannot afford to build the needed facilities, buy equipment that would make their operations more efficient, or experiment with new methods. The proposed agriculture grant program would help farmers pay for some of these improvements, either by itself or as matching funds to combine with grants from other sources. We believe that the result of this investment will be more agricultural production, more hiring of farm workers, and greater food security for O'ahu. We therefore encourage you to pass Resolution 21-79.

Dear Chair Waters and Members of the City Council:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in strong support of Resolution 21-79 which urges the Mayor to establish a grant program to support local agriculture under the Office of Economic Revitalization. When the COVID-19 pandemic hit our shores, our local residents experienced first-hand the fragileness our food system with empty food shelves and long lines at grocery stores.

With 88.4% of our food supply being imported, Hawai'i is far from being food secure. Furthermore, with only 12% of our 7,300 farms growing 90% of our food, we are dependent upon our larger farmers. Should one of the 875 large farms cease operations, Hawai'i stands to lose an even greater percentage of its food production. Because of this disparity, our smaller farmers really need help in increasing their size, production, and scale. However, with high labor, land, water and input costs, agriculture presents many barriers to entry and scaling for farmers. If Hawai'i, including Honolulu which has the largest population, is serious about creating greater food security and sustainability, it needs government to support it with grant programs such as this one.

The COVID-19 pandemic also created an urgent need for us to look at our dependence on the tourism industry. If we are to diversity and Hawai'i's economy, additional funding for agriculture will give us an opportunity to look at innovative agricultural programs using new technologies, such as vertical farming, aquaculture and others, to help rebuild our economy and create a new workforce.

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and selfsufficient through locally produced food; renewable energy and clean transportation; and better management of freshwater and waste.

Ulupono <u>supports</u> **Resolution 21-079**, which urges the City and County Administration, through the Office of the Mayor and the Office of Economic Revitalization (OER), to develop a grant program aimed at supporting local agriculture.

The City and County of Honolulu's OER has played a critical role in responding to the pandemic by providing much-needed resources to ensure O'ahu has a stable food supply to serve the needs of our community and our local producers. Although efforts have allowed some local farmers and ranchers to survive, the challenges of the pandemic remain for businesses and the public. Hawai'i has the highest unemployment rate in the nation, the ninth highest poverty rate in the nation, a food system that imports 90% of its supply, and food costs that are 82% higher than the national average. Over the last year, increased unemployment claims have intensified fears and uncertainty around access to the basic necessity of food. Adding to this perfect storm is the threat of a literal one as hurricane season nears. We would be gambling with lives to assume a pandemic is the only crisis Hawai'i may face in the coming months.

While our community begins its economic recovery, it is prudent to consider how local agriculture can help diversify the economy with increased local food production for local consumption and expand agricultural workforce opportunities for those seeking employment. Local farmers serve as a lifeline. They are our greatest defense against food insecurity and our greatest hope for future resiliency. They need our support as much as we need theirs.
