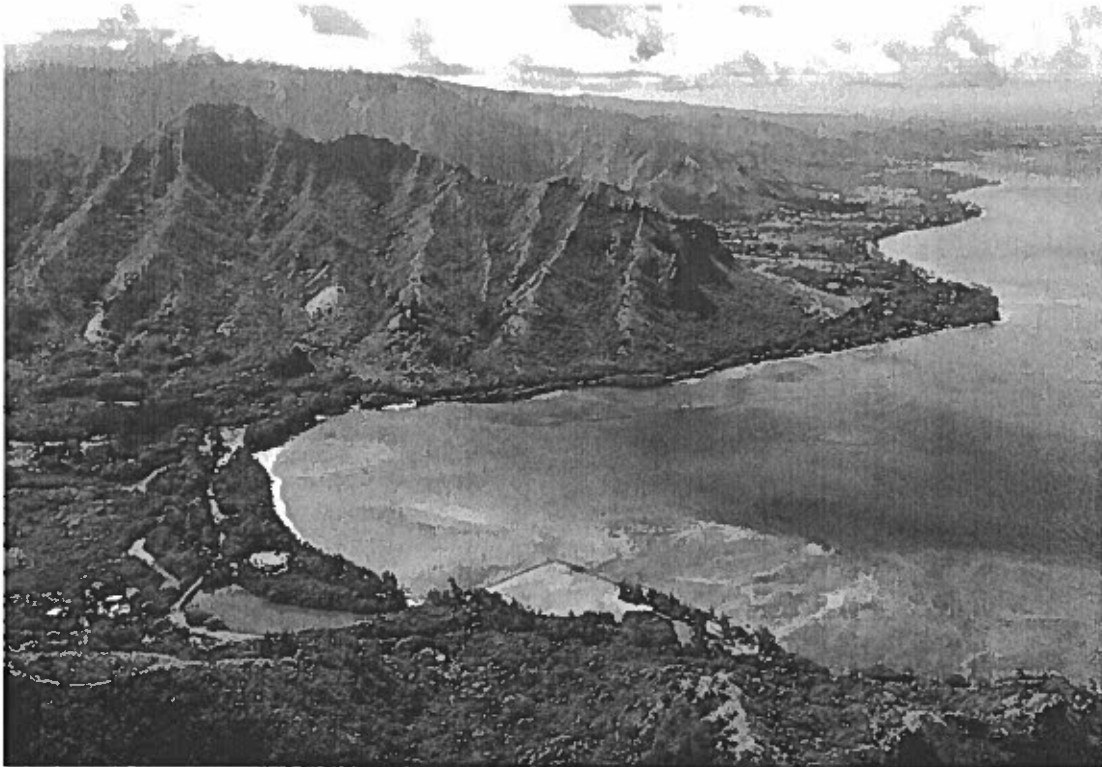

But, on the other hand, DPP is breaking up the Keep the Country Country **rural corridor** in Ko'olau Loa and the North Shore of Oahu.

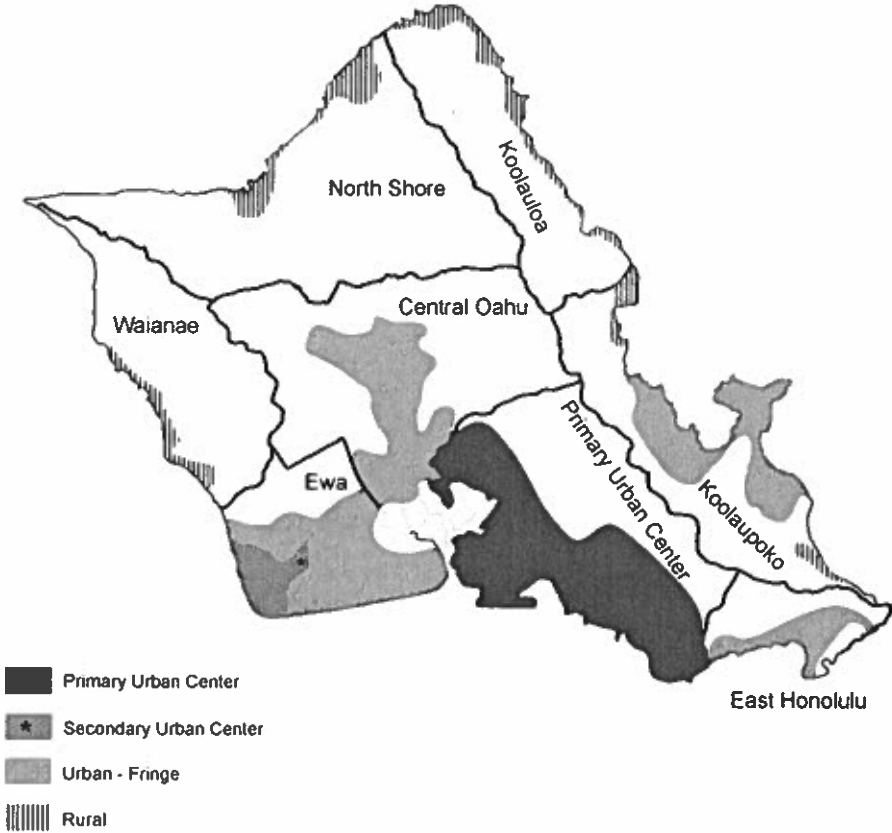


Recent Evolution of the Oahu General Plan Map

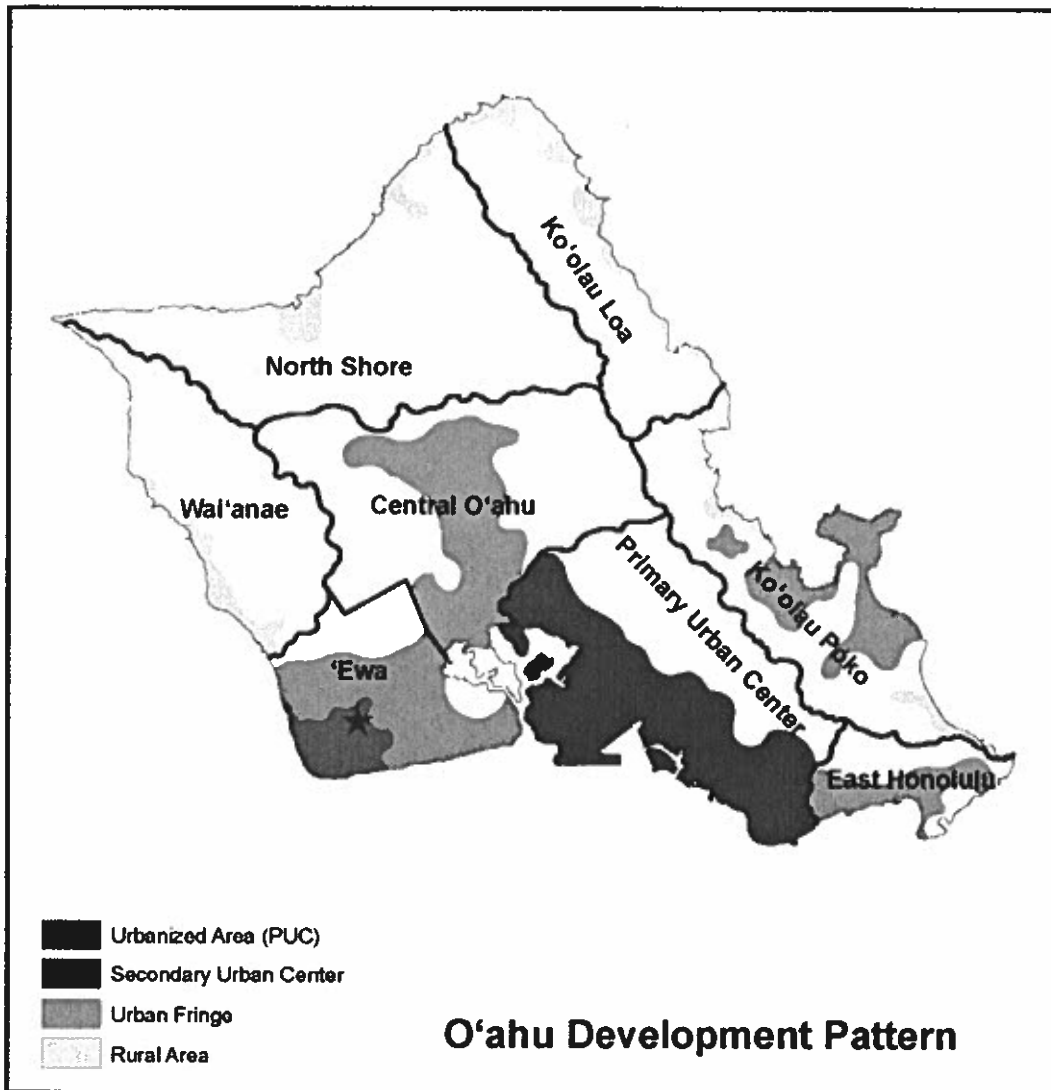
The City has also used the slogan that they must build rail to contain urban sprawl within the rail corridor in order to Keep the Country Country.

General Plan Development Pattern



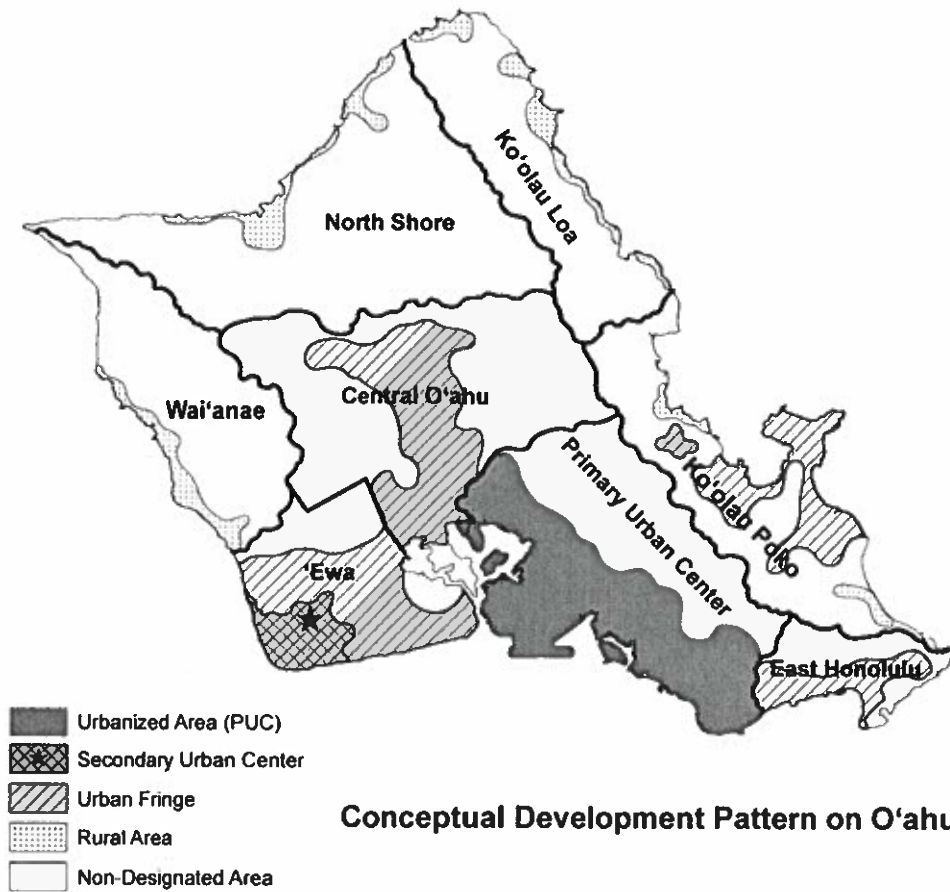

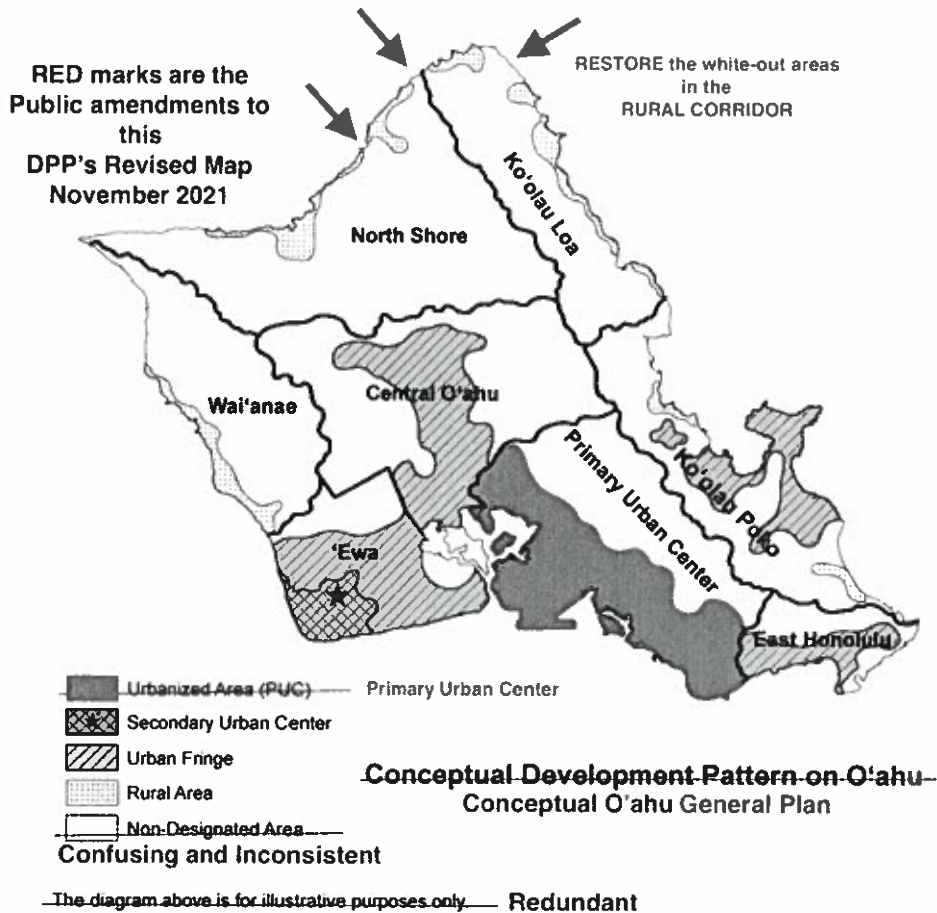

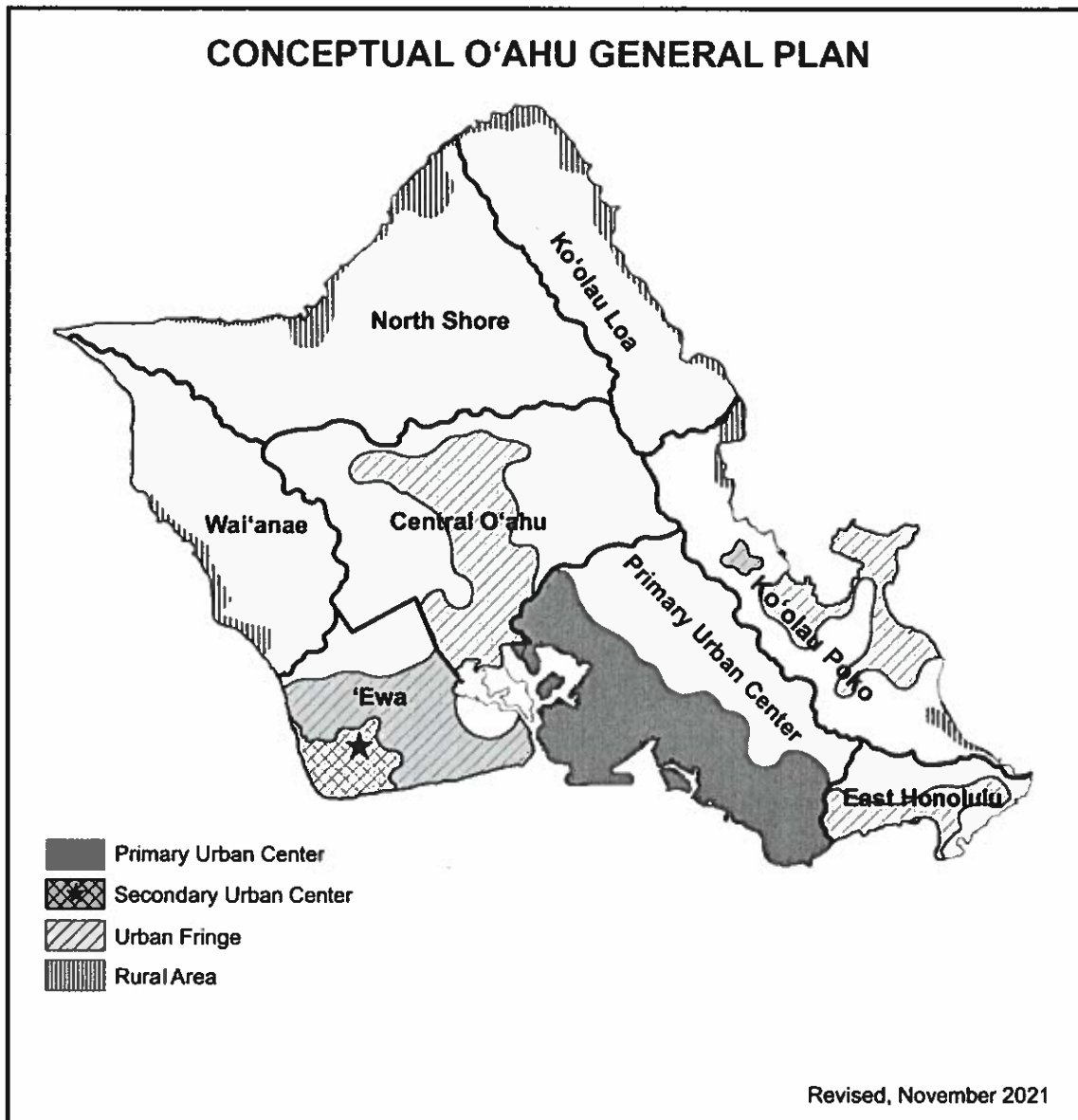
**Revised, November 2021*

2021 --- These are the Grassroots' reactions to DPP's November 2021 Revised Map. It is confusing, inconsistent, and discriminatory. (Red mark comments are from grassroots.)



1. DPP's new classification of white "Non-Designated Area" triggers inevitable inconsistencies and discrimination in its over-all implementation for ALL Oahu. Delete this classification.
2. The "Urbanized Area (PUC)" is deleted and restored to "Primary Urban Center". "Secondary" is not a stand-alone description. If there is a "secondary", there must be a "Primary" for clarity. Its like a "2" without the "1" .
3. The introduced white "Non-Designated Area" is also deleted because it's not applied accurately and consistently all across O'ahu. Any critical thinker can see that DPP's new "conceptual" category would quickly collapse into a complicated messiness and confusion.
4. The caption "*The diagram above is for illustrative purposes only*" is also deleted. (It's redundant if DPP sticks to its **conceptual** mode.)

2021 - THIS IS THE CLEAN COPY of the **GRASSROOTS MAP** SUBMITTED TO THE HONOLULU CITY COUNCIL FOR CONSIDERATION AND ADOPTION (Graphic to restore the rural corridor paid for by grassroots.)



This above Grassroots Conceptual O'ahu General Plan map cuts down on confusion for the Public. It more accurately reflects the sentiments of the public through the decades to protect the diversification values of the Oahu General Plan, including to Keep the Country Country.

The map is consistent. It's less non-discriminatory and causes less confusion. The Rural Corridor in the country is restored and preserved in concept. Other DPP's expanded development areas on the DPP Map remain unchanged

Department of Planning and Permitting downplays Oahu General Plan's significance

Throughout this process, DPP tries very hard to downplay the significance of this O'ahu General Plan. DPP continuously states to the City Council that the Oahu General Plan is not a "**regulatory**" document and that it is only "**conceptual**" guidelines and policies.

However, it must be noted that the O'ahu General Plan is mandated by the **Hawaii State Plan HRS (Hawaii Revised Statute) 226**

and the **City Charter Section 6-1508**

https://www.honolulu.gov/rep/site/cor/rch/Charter_2017_Ed_01.04.21_Clean_01.15.21.pdf to "*set forth the city's objectives and broad policies for the long range development of the city.*"

If DPP wants to be truly **conceptual**, it must continue to preserve the rural corridor in the Map. The "Rural Corridor" concept already provides an over-arching policy for Open Space, Agricultural, Preservation, Conservation, Community Boundary Growth, Low-density growth, Food Sustainability and so on.

DPP clearly vacillates from its proclaimed "conceptual" mode. In the Ko'olau Loa and the North Shore areas, DPP is very specific with placing its newly-created white "Non-Designated Area" to break the Rural Corridor on the Map.

Below is DPP's submitted explanations to Zoning and Planning Chair Brandon Elefante and Council Vice-Chair Esther Kia'aina about its new "Non-Designated Area" category for the Map:

*"Some of the revisions include changes to the title, addition of a category to identify **non-designated areas (which will represent non-development type designations such as preservation and agriculture).***

This Map is conceptual in nature and meant to be a visual aid, it is by no means a parcel-specific map or one that is used for regulatory purposes. Land uses continue to be regulated by a property's zoning under the Revised Ordinances of Honolulu, Chapter 21 (Land Use Ordinance), and if within the State Agricultural District, by Hawaii Revised Statutes, Chapter 205 (Land Use Commission).

DPP's above explanations for its new white "Non-Designated Area" imposed on the country rural corridor meant "no development" is grossly ill-formed and inaccurate on various levels. It's a red herring.

Does DPP not know that it's been providing developmental approvals to "Preservation" and "agriculture" areas in Oahu?

If DPP wishes to implement this new "Non-Designated Area" in the Rural Corridor, this designation must be implemented on ALL of Oahu.

DPP's now tries to clarify that its white "Non-Designated Area" includes the James Campbell Federal Wildlife Refuge in Kahuku and "agriculture" lands.

If this is DPP's rationale, then what about Ala Moana Regional Beach Park or the Kapiolani Regional Park in the Primary Urban Area? What about the Wahiawa Botanical Gardens in Central Oahu? What about the Patsy Mink Central Oahu Regional Park? The list of parks, preservation, conservation, and agricultural areas is situated all over O'ahu. Why be so discriminatory?

THE PUBLIC HAS NO TRUST IN DPP

It must be said that this new action by breaking up the "rural corridor" is not the first attempt to create breaches into the Rural Corridor.

Given DPP's chronic history with management, implementation, and adherence of the county's ordinances, policies and guidelines, the public simply have no trust or confidence in DPP. Whether it's fair or not, the public is increasingly cynical about DPP's allegiance and motives.

The decades-old concerns can be summarized in these public testimonies:

" . . . the unfettered and un-managed runaway commercialization of this most beautiful area of Oahu must stop immediately. The Oahu General Plan MUST REAFFIRM that any and all future growth and development protect rural Oahu."

"The revised DPP map is confusing and we want to make sure that any such map dos not allow for creative interpretation as allowing pockets of developments."

" From Waikiki. Developers have been swimming like sharks around the coastal areas of O'ahu for decades. Resolution 21-23 is going to hand them a feast of a silver platter. It makes me wonder what transactions have been going on in the back kitchen. KEEP THE COUNTRY COUNTRY! "

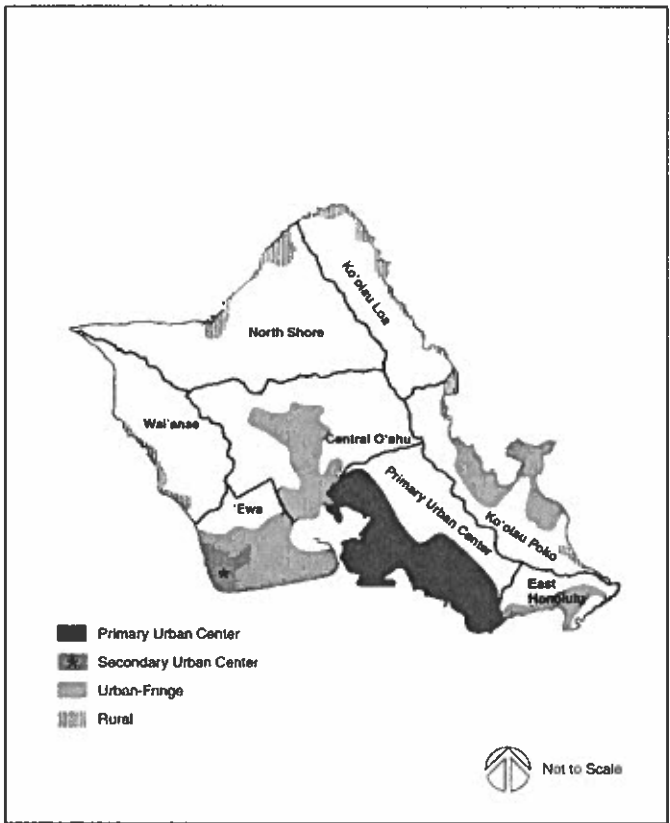
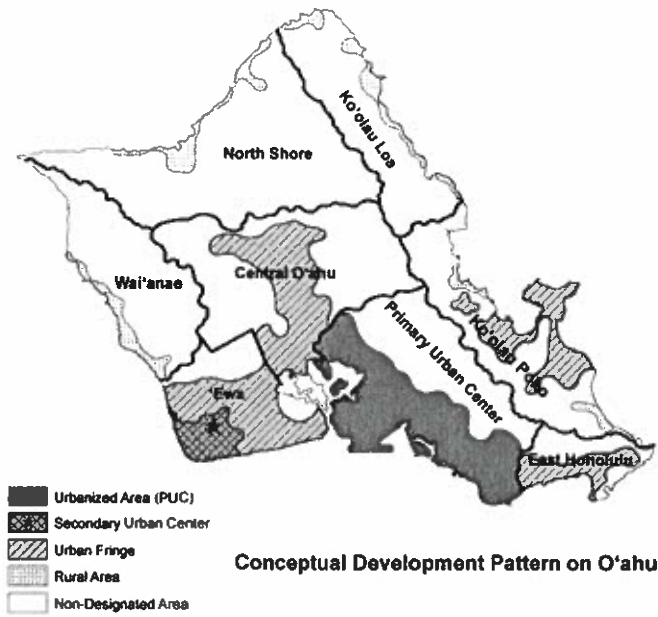


Exhibit 1-1: General Plan Designations

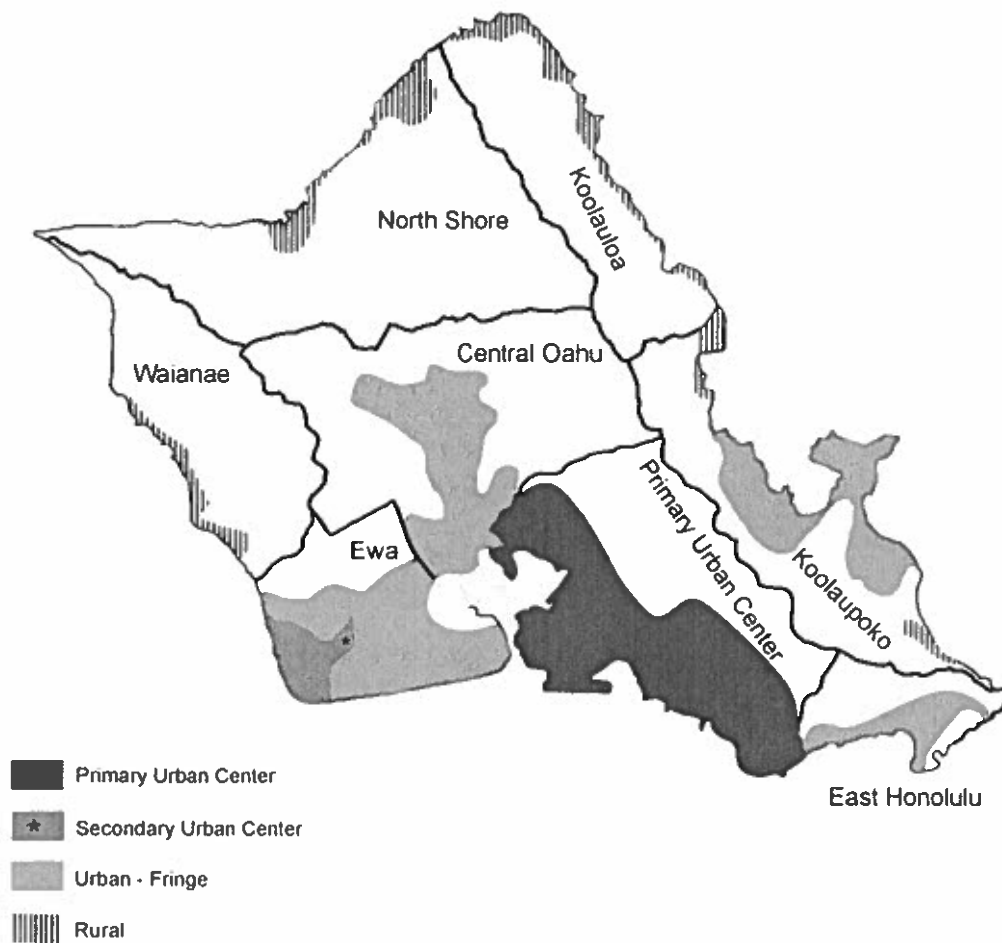

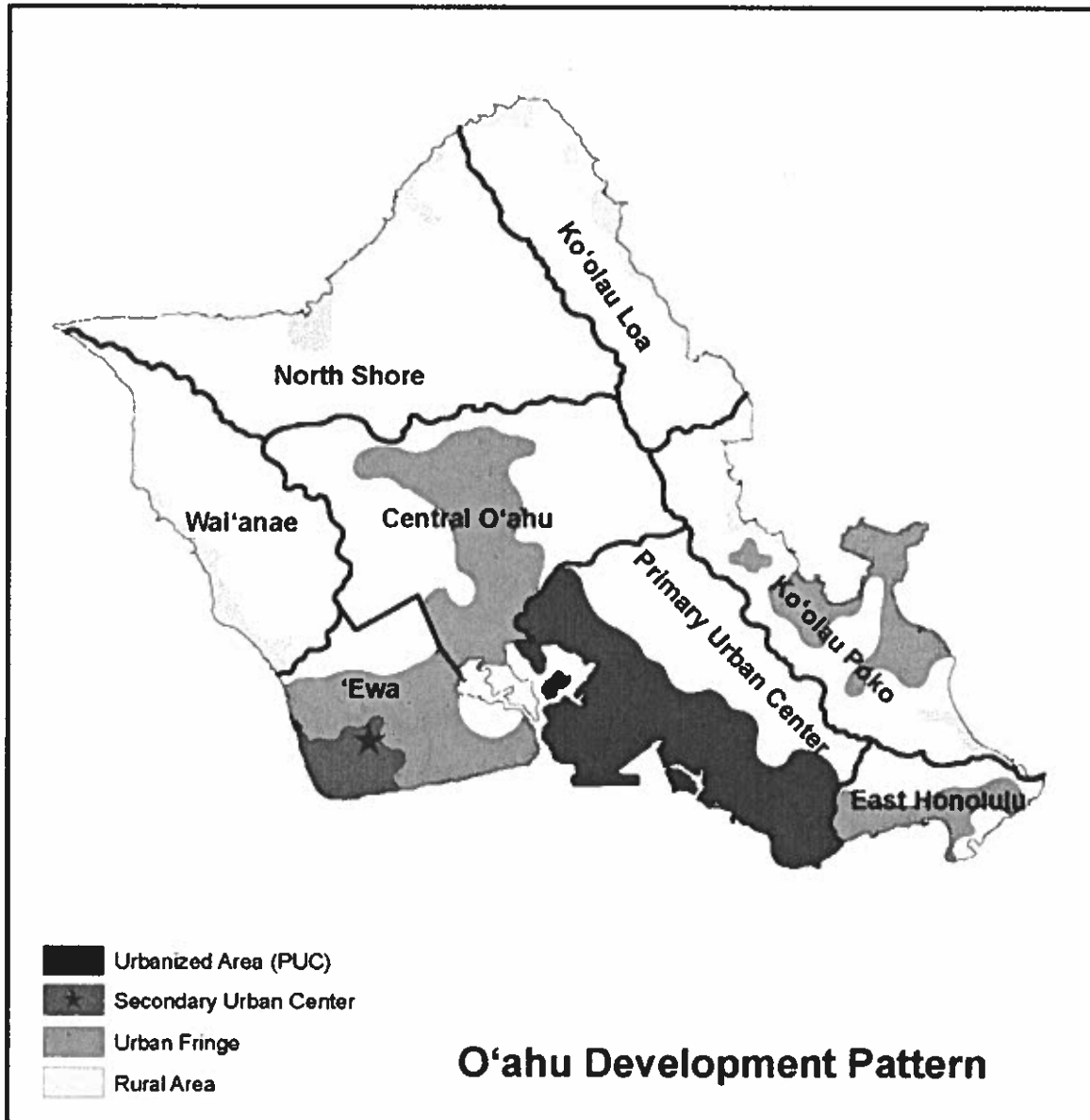

General Plan Development Pattern



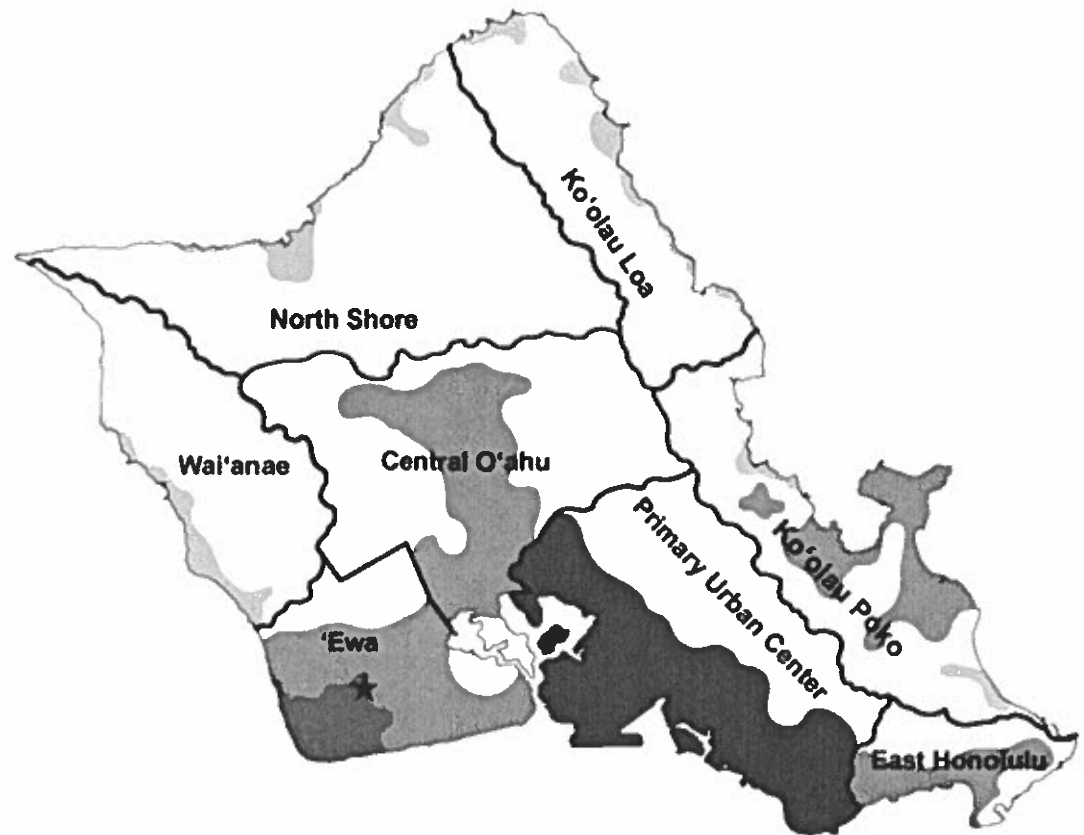
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Figure 3. Overall Development Pattern on O'ahu

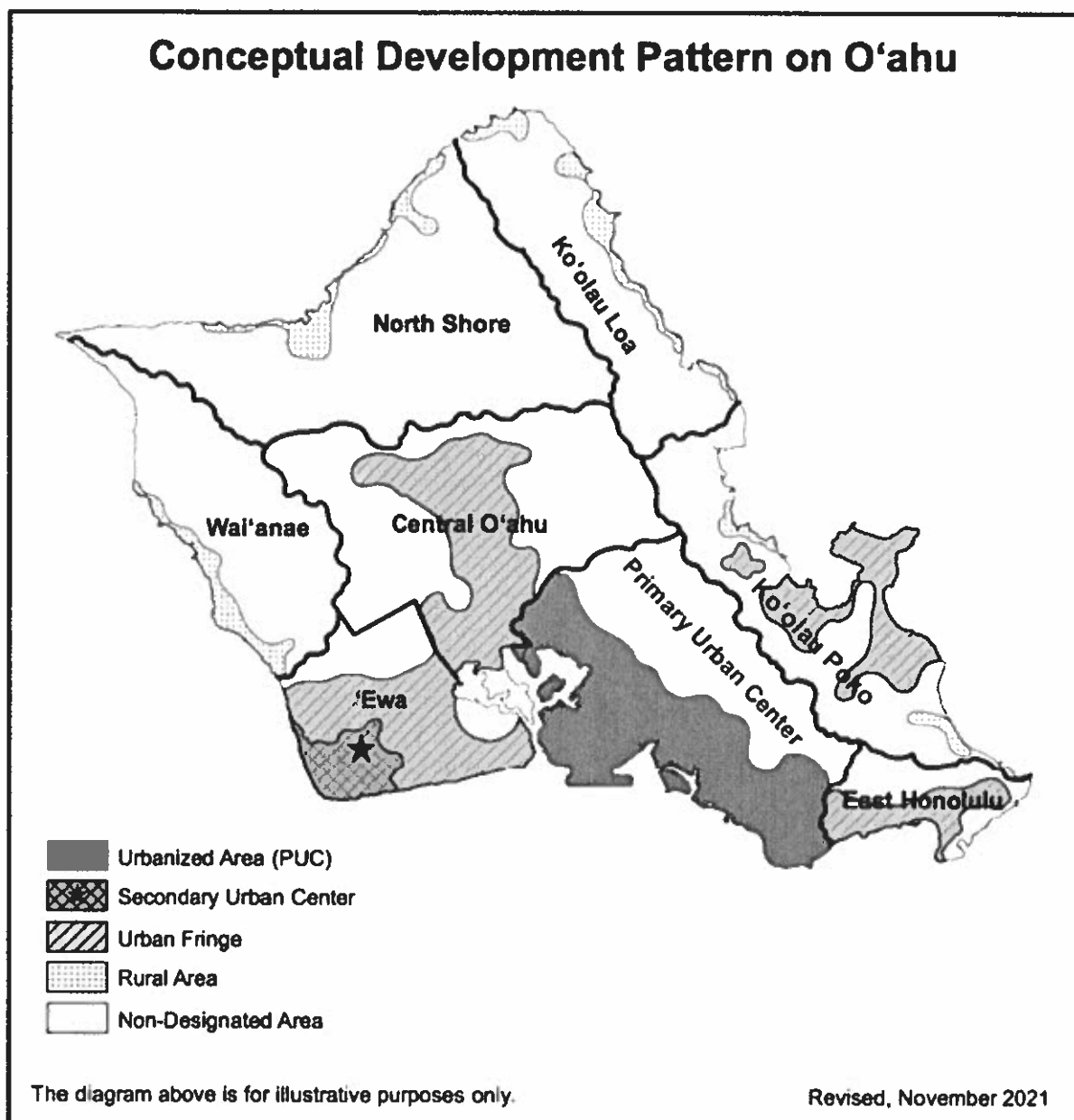

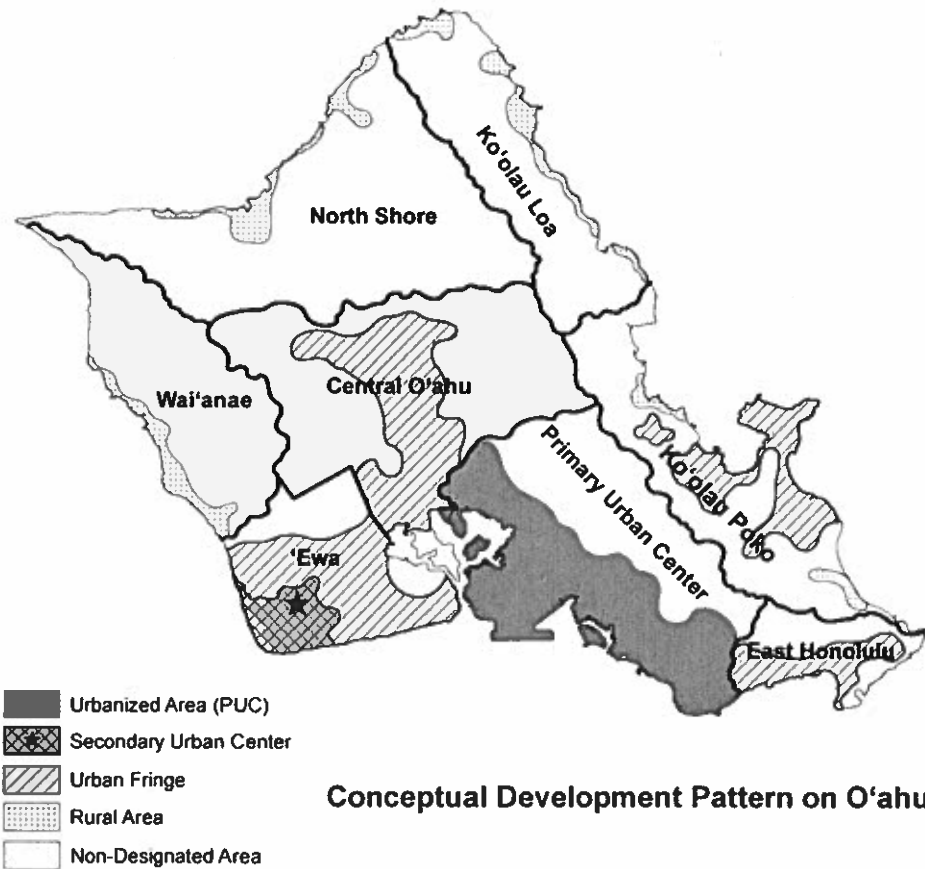

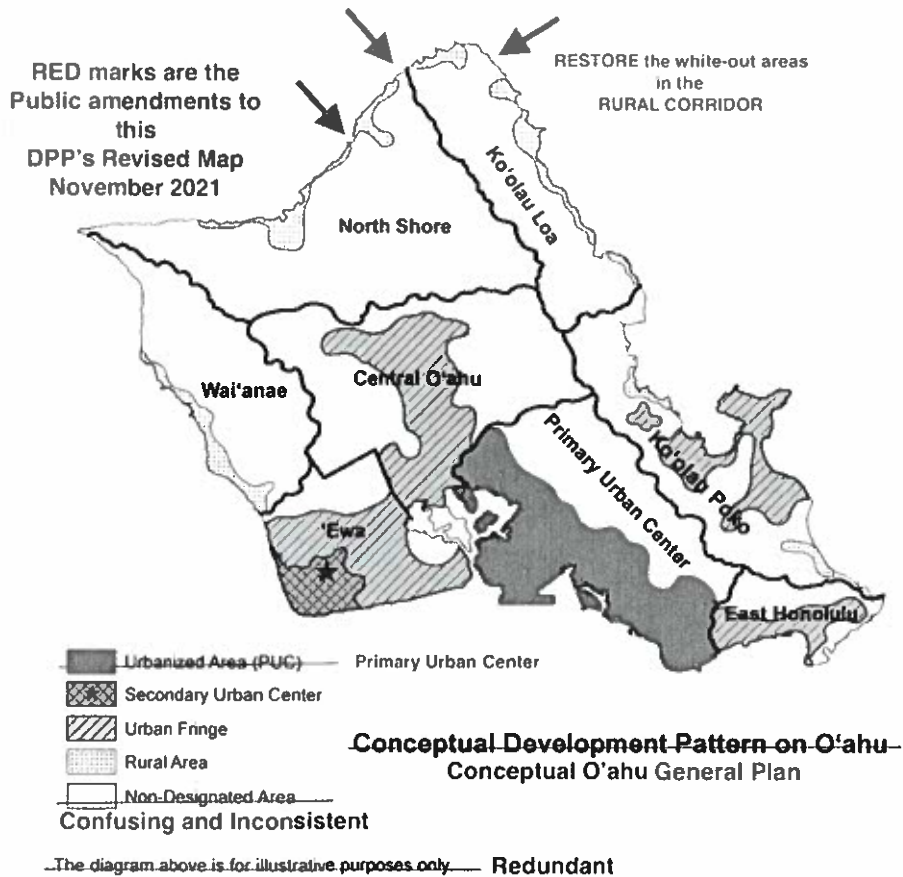

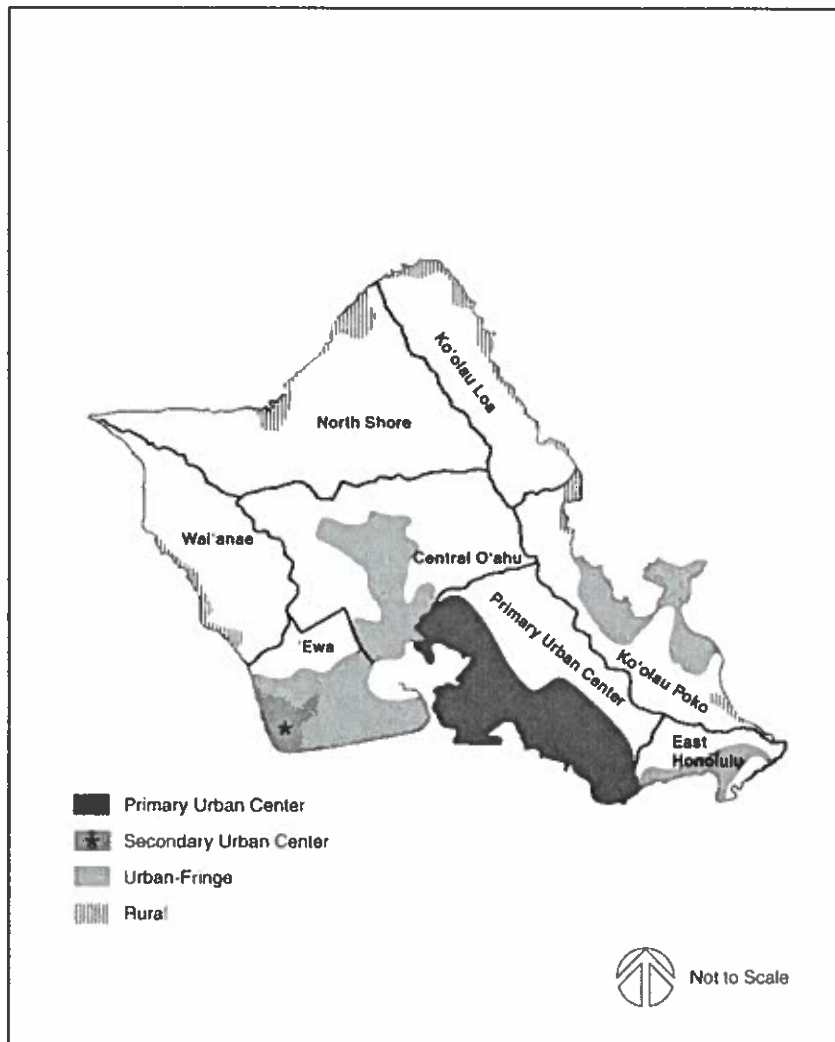


Exhibit 1-1: General Plan Designations

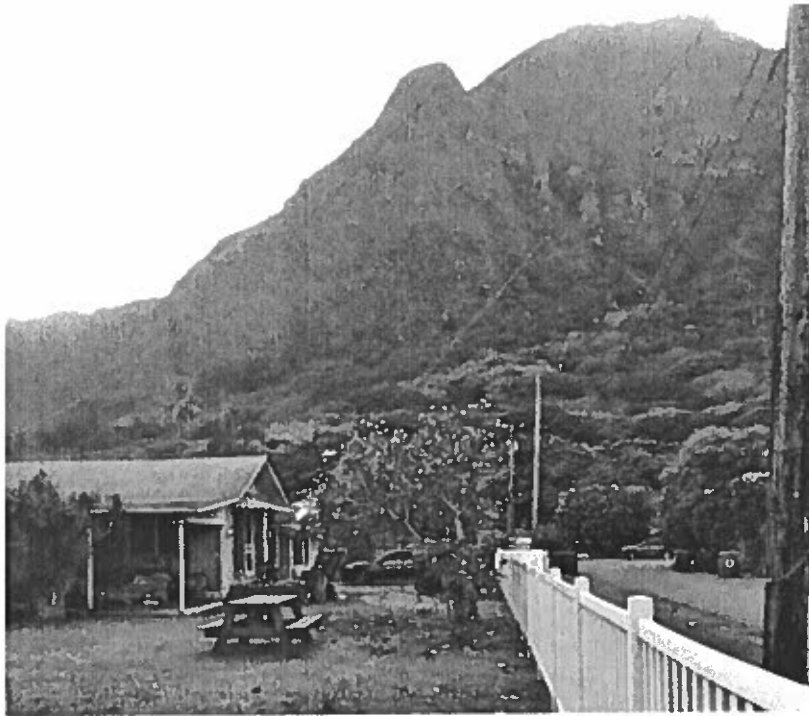

Kahuku Community Association strongly opposes DPP's revised map on page 21 of the Oahu General Plan set for adoption this coming December 1, 2021. This newly proposed map opens up the rural corridor in Kahuku and we strongly request that the City Council amend this map and restore the rural corridor for Kahuku as reflected in the map of Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan (pg 1-4 of 21-1, Ko`olauloa Sustainable Communities Plan November 2020).

The Ko`olau Loa Communities have long fought for over a decade to pass the Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan that was recently approved February 11, 2021. KCA feels that the revised Oahu General Plan must be consistent with the Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan for the following reasons.

The Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan defines the region's role and identity within the overall framework of island planning and land management (pg ES-1 of 21-1, Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan November 2020)." The vision for Ko`olauloa's future is to "preserve the region's rural character" (pg ES-2 of 21-1) as displayed in Exhibit 1-1 by preserving the rural corridor in Kahuku (pg 1-4 of 21-1).

This is important because the "Community Growth Boundary defines, protects, and contains communities in areas that the General Plan designates "rural" and guides land use and preserves open space and agricultural areas". It also serves to preserve areas and can include lands designated as park, agriculture and preservation areas. (page 2-2 or 21-1, Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan November 2020)

The revised map or diagram on the Oahu General Plan deletes the designated rural area in Kahuku directly contradicting the Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan. Consistency is important to prevent any confusion and to continue to direct the future land use and development of the area to "remain rural, with wide open spaces, agricultural lands and rural communities continuing to define the rural landscape." (page 2-1 of 21-1, Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan November 2020),

Before adopting the Oahu General Plan, KCA respectfully requests the City Council to reinstate the rural corridor in Kahuku as reflected in the Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan (see attached) and amend the map currently reflected on the Oahu General Plan.

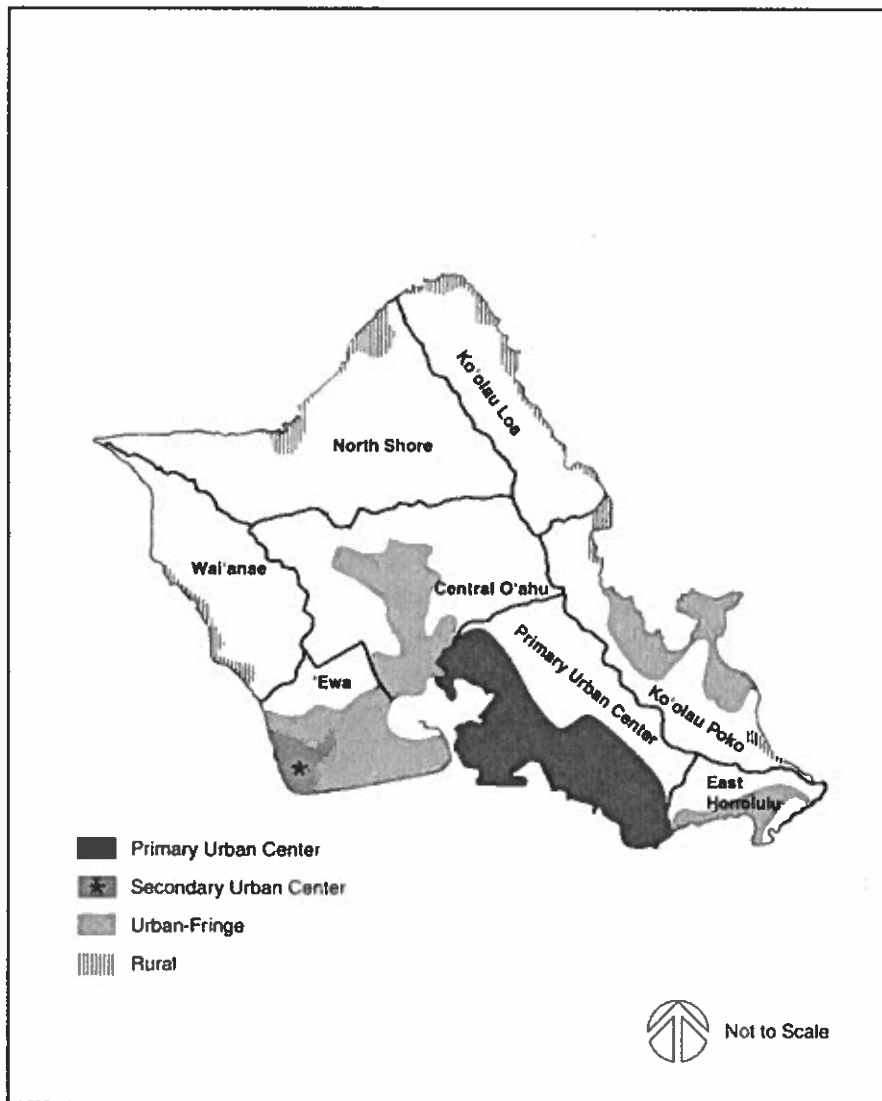


Exhibit 1-1: General Plan Designations

Resolution 21-23 CD1 Proposed Oahu General Plan Map - Figure 3, Page 21

The Oahu General Plan Hui thanks Councilmember Elefante, Council Chair Waters and all Council members who assisted in creating a General Plan that promotes sustainability, acknowledges the importance of our island's natural resources, promotes environmental and social justice, recognizes the climate change crisis and that never-ending growth on our island is not sustainable.

There is one glaring problem and that is the proposed map, attached as Exhibit A, contained in Resolution 21-23 CD1, is confusing and in our opinion is flawed for the following reasons.

1) Without explanation the proposed map deletes *Primary Urban Center* and replaces it with Urbanized Area (PUC). The *Primary Urban Center* is defined and referred to throughout the General Plan and is part of the directed growth policy. There is no definition of or referral to Urbanized Area (PUC) in the existing General Plan or the Resolution 21-23 CD1 version. The Primary Urban Center (PUC) Development Plan has set boundaries and definition of the PUC consistent with language in the existing General Plan and General Plan map.

2) The introduction of Non-Designated Area in reference to the white areas in the map is confusing. What does Non-Designated Area refer to? According to the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) Non-Designated Area refers to agriculture and preservation/conservation land yet that explanation is not written in the General Plan or DPs and SCPs. Throughout Oahu's General Plan and Development and Sustainable Community Plans there are multiple references and definitions for rural area, Primary Urban Center, Secondary Urban Center, and Urban Fringe, but there is no reference or definition of Non-Designated Area. If DPP and the Council wish to include Non-Designated Area in the proposed map, then there must be a legend/definition explaining what a Non-Designated Area is. If the area is agriculture, it should say that.

3) If the proposed map in Resolution 21-23 CD1 is adopted, then none of the maps in the DPs and SCPs will be consistent with the new adopted General Plan map. All DPs and SCPs, including the recently passed Ko`olau Loa Sustainable Communities Plan contain the existing map, attached as Exhibit B. If the proposed Figure 3 map on page 21 is adopted, there will be a conflict between the maps. Which map will supersede - the map in the DPs and SCPs or the map in the newly adopted General Plan?

4) The General Plan speaks of retaining rural areas, rural communities and open spaces, yet the proposed map in Resolution 21-23 CD1 removes a large chunk of the rural corridor and puts the areas into a Non-Designated Area. Whichever map the Council adopts, the rural corridor in Ko`olau Loa and Ko`olaupoko represented in the Sustainable Community Plans should be retained as shown in Exhibit B, which is the current map in the General Plan.

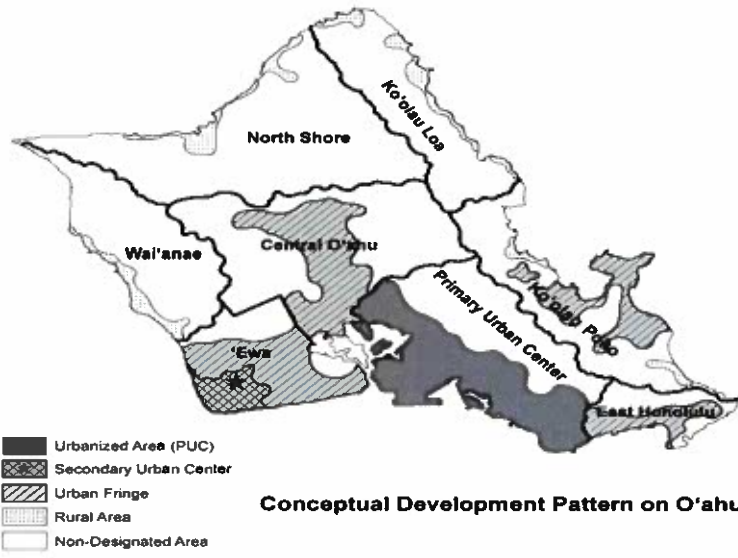
5) The title of the map *General Plan Development Pattern* should be retained because the proposed title Conceptual Development Pattern does not reflect the city's directed growth pattern articulated in the General Plan.

In conclusion, we urge you to adopt our recommendations to make a General Plan that works and reflects the provisions set forth in the City Charter Section 6-1508 *The general plan shall set forth the city's objectives and broad policies for the long-range development of the city. It shall contain statements of the general social, economic, environmental and design objectives to be achieved for the general welfare and prosperity of the people of the city and the most desirable population distribution and regional development pattern.*

General Plan Development Pattern

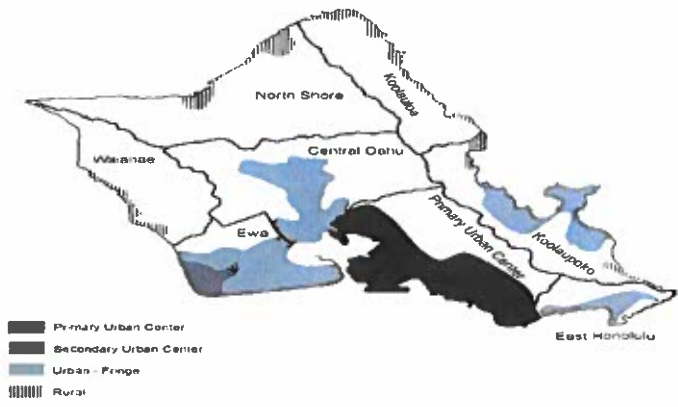

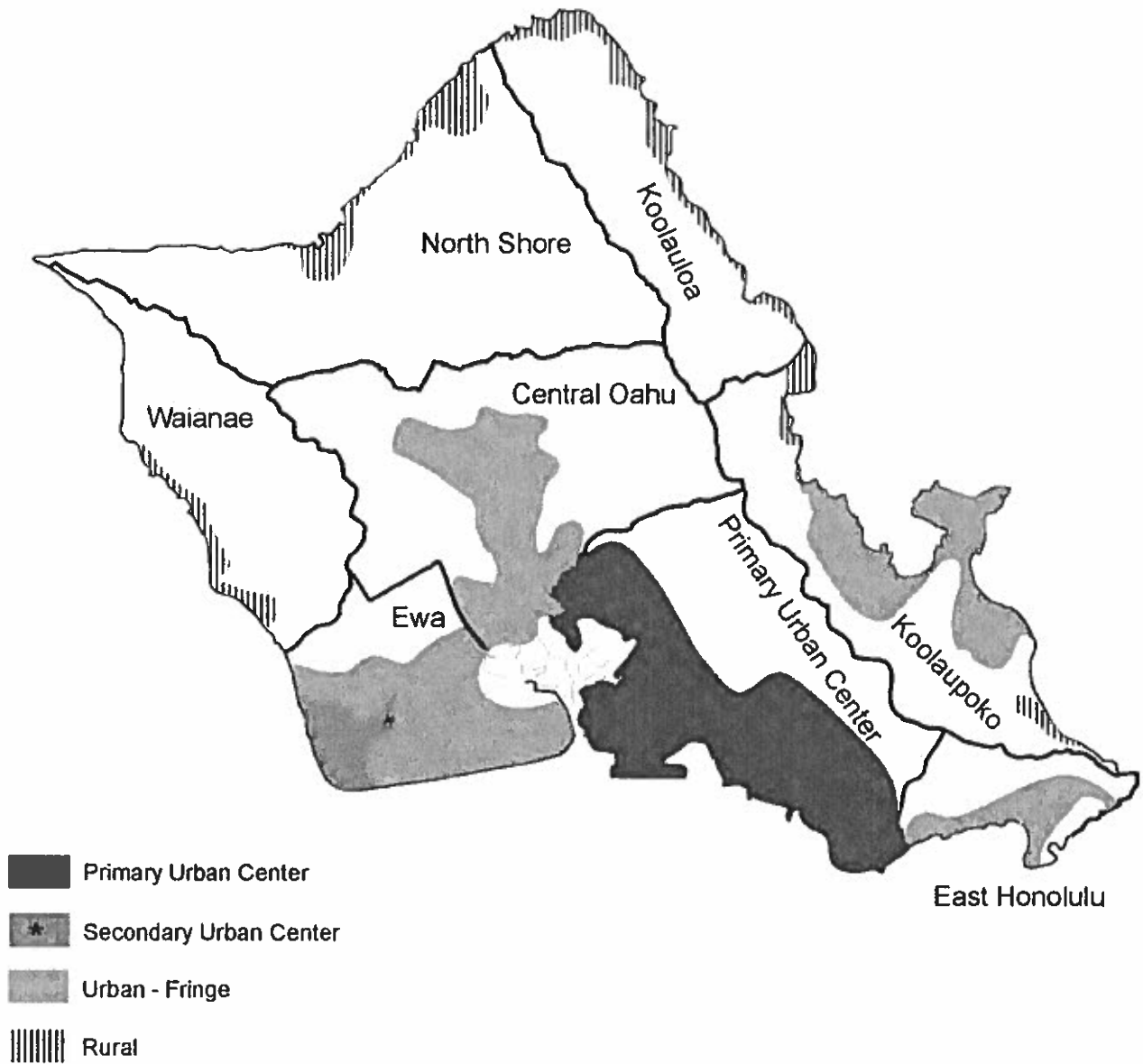
Aloha Chair Waters and Councilmembers,

He has been fair, transparent and truthful in his dealings with our Community and Committees and I believe he will continue to be a great resource in this new role.

I am in support of Bill 38, CD1

Relating to commercial activities at public parks. (Addressing commercial activities at certain beach parks.) As shared previously in different Council meetings, as a lifetime resident of Waimānalo, we must preserve the integrity of our rural and culturally grounded community, its natural and cultural resources, and the genuine fabric that is Waimānalo. For too many years, our community concerns has fallen on deaf ears, and the impacts continue to put strains on all involved. We must acknowledge those that have been trying to be in compliance, and until we have better enforcement systems in place, and a system that truly adds value and benefit to the community, I

support the ban of commercial activities. I also want to add the importance in proper spelling of the names listed and ask that they be edited to reflect the appropriate diacritical markings. Lastly I want to offer a potential solution that I hope we may explore, in a joint conversation with the City and County of Honolulu Parks and Recreation, the appropriate elected officials, the Community, Commercial entities, the United States Marine Corps and the Bellows Airforce Command, and others, where we may be able to identify a location within the boundaries of the public use area in the Bellows Air Force Base and look at a better managed approach to commercial activity.

I am in support of Resolution 21-192

Initiating amendments to the Revised Charter of the City and County of Honolulu 1973 (Amended 2017 Edition), as amended, relating to the Affordable Housing Fund and do believe that changing the percentage will allow for additional and much overdue efforts to establish truly affordable housing.

I am in support of Bill 40, CD2 with reservations about the percentage breakdown

Relating to the transient accommodations tax. (Establishing a transient accommodations tax for the City and County of Honolulu, providing for its imposition and disposition, and facilitating the receipt and deposit of the revenues derived from the transient accommodations tax.) I am not in favor of the Honolulu Rail System and feel that it continues to pull critically important funding away from what I believe to be more priority focuses, such as our environment and preservation of our land.
