Dear Chair and Council Members,

The tenuous condition of the Navy's Red Hill fuel tank installation has troubled local people for decades. Unfortunately, with the recent leaks on May 6, 2021, and November 20, 2021, and the knowledge that the Navy concealed information about past leaks, the situation has become increasingly perilous. Thus, representing the interests of our 4,100+ members, who are residents of Mānoa, the Mālama Mānoa Board of Directors implores the Honolulu City Council to vote in SUPPORT of Bill 48.

While we appreciate the mission of the Navy, we are seriously concerned with the lack of environmental stewardship at the Red Hill site. Specifically, we question the service life of the tanks, since they were constructed between 1940-1943, and are now in a dire state of erosion. The Navy's approach of cleaning, inspecting, and patching is not sufficient to protect the people living in Honolulu's primary urban core.

Written Testimony

The scientific data that has been collected at the site does not provide ample evidence that the Navy is able to effectively maintain and operate the site safely until 2045. Consequently, we strongly support the Board of Water Supply's recommendation to move the fuel away from the aquifer into above ground storage tanks, and to reinforce the tanks with a secondary containment system. Also, we expect each tank and alarm system to be inspected more rigorously and frequently, at least annually. Furthermore, the Navy should be transparent and cooperate with BWS and DOH.

In Hawai'i, our watersheds have been revered and carefully managed with the ahupua'a system, which was created centuries ago by the High Chief Mā'ilikūkahi. Our people are just as precious as those living

in Manchester, Washington and Point Loma, San Diego, California, where the Navy relocated and improved other fuel tank facilities. Clean, fresh water is essential for life, and we deserve the equal treatment by the Navy to protect our constitutional right to life. We ask that the City & County of Honolulu, in coordination with DOH and the EPA, do whatever is in its power to expedite remediation of this impending disaster. Sincerely,

My name is Noel Kaleikalaunuoka'oia'i'o Shaw. As a resident of O'ahu, Hawaiian Homestead leasee, and a water drinker, I strongly support Bill 48, requiring any operator of underground storage tanks with a capacity of 100,000 gallons or more, to obtain a permit from the City. It further stipulates that no permit will be granted unless the applicant proves that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment. We simply cannot permit underground storage tanks of that capacity or larger that pose such immense threat of leaking and contaminating our environment and water supply.

Written Testimony The issue at Kapukākī, Red Hill, has been eye opening. My family has lived on O'ahu for many generations and we continue to plan to do so for many more generations. We cannot allow for another situation to occur like the Navy's negligence resulting in the contamination of our water resources and the sickening of Hawai'i residents. The ramifications of which we will continue to have to deal with for many more years and we may have already been exposed to having been residents in Aliamanu for a number of years, even prior to 1995 when the public learned of the tanks existence.

The Red Hill facility – the fragile, antiquated fuel tanks and supporting systems – has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Shutting down Red Hill immediately and entirely is the only way to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

I strongly support bill 48 and see this situation as an important crisis.

The Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility ("Facility") is a prime example of how a leaky underground storage tank can threaten our most precious resource.

The DOH has concluded that the storage of up to 187 million gallons of fuel, 100 feet above a drinking water resource, is inherently dangerous.

The Facility's tanks, each with a 12.5 million-gallon capacity, had a quarter-inch thick steel liner when first constructed nearly 80 years ago. They are encased in aging concrete and sit 100 feet above O'ahu's drinking water aquifer. These steel liners have been corroding to the point where many through-wall holes have been found and tare now less than one-third of their original thickness in some places.

Written Testimony These tanks have leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since they were constructed and the Navy's own risk assessment from 2018 concluded that the probability of an acute leak of between 1,000 and 30,000 gallons (independent of any earthquake risk) over the next ten years is 96%. The Navy cannot prove that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment.

Approximately 93,000 people living in military housing have been unable to use their water for several weeks. Water will not be restored, and those who were displaced will not be able to return home, for at least six to eight weeks, if not longer. If the Navy water system is further compromised, our housing crisis will mushroom.

DOH said that a water sample taken from the Red Hill drinking water shaft on December 5 confirmed the water is contaminated with "high levels" of petroleum and gasoline. The sample detected total petroleum hydrocarbons diesel range organics levels 350 times above the DOH Environmental Action Level (EAL) for drinking water, and gasoline range organics more than 66 times the DOH EAL.

Lower levels of petroleum products were also found in samples collected from the Aliamanu

Child Development Center as well as homes located on the Navy's water system. The 14,000 gallon leak of water-fuel mixture through a fire suppression system drain line at Red Hill in mid-November is suspected to be the cause of this water contamination crisis. Navy officials cannot be trusted to protect our water. They have lied time and time again: The Navy lied about an active leak at Pearl Harbor for months, discovering the leak in January 2021 but not informing Health Department officials until May. This was revealed in whistleblower emails and documents in October.

A whistleblower also told the Department of Health in September that Navy officials provided false testimony and withheld information about the full extent of the Facility's infrastructure, including connected pipelines, as well as "historical records of corrosion issues, including holes in tanks" at its Red Hill fuel facility during legal proceedings. The Navy continues to confuse and gaslight community members.

The Navy suspended use of its Red Hill water shaft on November 28, but the public only found out on December 1.

Hundreds of community members reported chemical smells in their water on November 28 and then health issues on November 29, which the Navy refused to acknowledge as a potential health concern until the state Department of Health advised residents to not drink the clearly contaminated water.

A day after the Navy said it had detected diesel in its 'Aiea Hālawa well at levels more than double the DOH safety limit, the military backtracked, saying the contaminated sample "did not come directly" from the well and the Navy does not believe the result proves the well is contaminated.

They continue to not be transparent despite agreeing to the Administrative Order of Consent, which requires them to be more forthcoming about operations at the Red Hill facility. The BWS Hālawa shaft will be shut down until fuel is removed from the tanks and may not reopen for years to come. This shaft was a source of water for South O'ahu from Hālawa to Maunalua. The BWS has advised that mandatory water conservation measures will now need to be in place in the summer of 2022.

Please help us sustain drinking water for Hawaii's future! We need all your help.

As a Kanaka Maoli I am a lifelong resident of 'Oahu. I have spent all my life here on the island of 'Oahu raising my children and my grandchildren. As an involved and voting member of my community I am concerned about the current handling of the Red Hill bulk fuel storage facility.

The United State military has had a long and troubling history in Hawai'i from the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom to the use of Kaho'olawe as a target for bombing practice. It appears that in many respects some things never change. While the Navy suspended the use of the Red Hill facility on November 28, the public continued to drink from this water source up to December 1.

#### Written Testimony

Many people within the community reported chemical smells coming from their water as well as health concerns they were experiencing. The Navy's response to this was to refuse to acknowledge a potential health concern, and it was the state Department of Health who advised residents to not drink the clearly contaminated water.

Soon after the Navy conceded and stated that it had detected diesel in its 'Aiea Hālawa well at levels more than double the DOH safety limit, we now know that those levels are over 350 times the safe level.

The Navy continues to not be transparent despite agreeing to the Administrative Order of Consent, which requires them to be more forthcoming about operations at the Red Hill facility.

I am here to state my support of Bill 48 which requires a permit from the City. Long term I

support the shutting down of the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility.

As stated earlier as a native to this place I understand the absolute importance of clear water. I want to continue to raise my pregenity in a place where the basic necessity of life, water, is clean, pure and safe. There is no substitute for pure water.

I am asking the Honolulu City Council Committee on Transportation, Sustainability and Health to support Bill 48 and eventually shut down the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Facility.

In the words of George Helm, "We are in a 'revolution of consciousness' .... What we (are) looking for is the truth . . . there is man and there is environment. One does not supersede the other . . . My name is Dyson Chee, I am 19 years old, and I am submitting written testimony on behalf of the Hawai'i Youth Climate Coalition (HYCC) in strong support of Bill 48.

HYCC is a youth-led, youth-founded organization dedicated to taking on the climate crisis through just and equitable means. While the Red Hill fuel tanks do contribute to the climate crisis, with the fuel being a fossil fuel product itself, this issue goes far beyond climate change. It is a human health, cultural, and environmental disaster that has been decades in the making.

The removal of the Red Hill fuel tanks is of tantamount importance for anyone who drinks fresh water. The Navy has proven that they are unable to prevent the tanks from leaking into our aquifer, and they have failed to demonstrate practicable tank upgrade alternatives. Although our fresh water source is being threatened today, we must also keep in mind that this issue is expected to get worse in the future. Researchers at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa have found that, under a dry future climate scenario, the amount of fresh water we can draw from our aquifer could decrease significantly by 2050.

In a way, the Red Hill crisis happening currently may be a blessing in disguise—if we take action and remove the tanks now, we may be spared from having a grimmer crisis in the future when our aquifer becomes more depleted than it is now. This, among many other reasons, is why we must maintain pressure on the Navy to remove the fuel tanks.

Finally, we would like to thank those who have been at the forefront of this issue for several years, serving as trailblazers for the sake of our community, and to those who are taking firm action now to ensure that this same crisis does not plague our children and their futures.

We hope that this committee will pass Bill 48, and mahalo for considering our testimony.

My name is Rebekah Garrison and I am a white settler who calls O'ahu home. I am a water drinker, a member of O'hu Water Protectors, and a community organizer for Hawai'i Peace and Justice (HPJ). HPJ is a grassroots organization that strives to create a more peaceful, just and sustainable Hawai'i. One of our priorities is protecting the islands from the negative environmental and social impacts of militarization.

Thank you to the council members for hearing Bill 48 CD1 and for prioritizing the protection of the island's most precious resource-clean, unpolluted drinking water. HPJ strongly supports the passage of Bill 48 CD1.

The Navy has assured us that it can safely operate the 20 deteriorating fuel tanks holding 200 million gallons of fuel a mere 100 feet above O'ahu's sole-source aquifer. But history has proven that the Navy cannot protect the water from the leaking fuel in its antiquated fuel storage system. This is not a hypothetical problem. The aquifer has already been contaminated. People have already been poisoned and hospitalized. Pets have already died.

We strongly support Bill 48 CD 1, which would empower the City and County of Honolulu to enforce regulations on underground storage tanks. Additionally recent amendments are acceptable but still we simply cannot permit underground storage tanks of that capacity or larger that pose such immense threat of leaking and contaminating our environment and water supply. Frankly, tanks of any size should not be located in proximity to our aquafers which is included in the new amendments, thank you.

Aloha, Members of the Committee:

The Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i has 5,450 enrolled members within the State Party's total membership of about 140,000. The Environmental Caucus has been leading the Party's expressions of grave concerns about the Red Hill UST facility since the Caucus was founded some ten years ago.

We have already testified in favor of Bill 48, and continue to support the bill.

Just this past Saturday, January 8, 2022, we introduced a resolution at a meeting of the Party's State Central Committee, which passed unanimously, calling for the immediate closure of the Red Hill UST facility. (A copy is attached.)

We will keep our concerns brief:

1. The massive facility is a threat of environmentally catastrophic proportions for the people of Hawai'i. A significant "spill" could gush out 24,000 gallons of fuel per minute and would fundamentally destroy the drinking water supply for the entire Island of O'ahu, home to the City and County of Honolulu, with a total resident population of about one million. Honolulu would essentially become uninhabitable.

- The USTs are alternatively described as corroding, once ¼-inch thick sheet metal
  encased on several feet of wet, porous concrete, or as concrete "lined with" these thin
  metal sheets, that allow thousands of gallons of jet fuel to ooze through these failing
  barriers annually;
- 3. This facility is much too vast in size, scope, and complexity to be competently managed by Navy personnel who rotate on short-term assignments through the Joint Base at Pearl Harbor-Hickam for them to understand it adequately; it is therefore, not surprising that the Navy repeatedly blames "leaks" or "spills" on "human error";
- 4. There are 20 tanks in this facility: two have been taken off-line, evidently permanently; some of these tanks have not been inspected in more than 20, 30, or even 40 years! This points to the Navy's complete inability to manage the facility in a safe and competent manner;
- 5. Even under the current environmental review process in which the Navy participates pursuant to an "Administrative Order on Consent," an Emergency Order dated December 6, 2021, recently reaffirmed by the Hawai'i State Department of Health, merely requires the Navy to "defuel," *i.e.*, drain the tanks only ONCE, to conduct inspections and repairs, then the Emergency Order allows the Navy to refill them upon the completion of corrective action;
- 6. Refilling the tanks is entirely unacceptable; they must be left permanently empty of jet fuel or any other hydrocarbons; they must be used for entirely environmentally benign uses, such as possibly storage of clean water, or they must be filled with neutral fill material;
- 7. The Navy is currently and actively polluting the Hālāwa Stream and nearshore waters with polluted runoff as it attempts to clean up the pollution caused by the "leaks" of last year; this must urgently be stopped immediately;

8. Congress must authorize and appropriate sufficient funds on an urgent basis to remove the fuels from the USTs at Red Hill and decommission the facility permanently. Congress has upgraded every other comparable facility in other places throughout the United States. Hawai'i desperately needs similar consideration.

With respect to Bill 48, C.D. 1, we appreciate the proposed amendments which strengthen the bill. However, we have one particular concern: Paragraph 3 of the summary of the changes that proposed C.D. 1 would make to the original bill states:

3. [Proposed C.D. 1] provides that the standard to granting or renewal of a UST permit will be whether the UST or UST system will be protective of human health and the environment, rather than a determination that the UST or UST system will not leak any regulated substance into the environment during its operating life.

The Environmental Caucus would prefer a "both-and" approach, rather than an "either-or" approach. We suggest that the granting of an initial or renewal permit for the operation of an UST must satisfy BOTH requirements: (1) that the UST or UST system will be protective of human health and the environment, and (2) that the UST or UST system will not leak any regulated substance into the environment during its operating life.

Thank you very much for the opportunity to testify on this matter that is so critical to the people of O'ahu, and indeed all of Hawai'i.

# SCC RESOLUTION URGING THE IMMEDIATE DRAINING OF THE U.S. NAVY RED HILL FUEL STORAGE TANKS AND CLOSURE OF THE FACILITY

Whereas, The Navy's Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility is a massive, dangerous facility, nearly 80 years old, that sits just 100 feet above the sole source Southern O'ahu Basal groundwater Aquifer that provides 77% of O'ahu's drinking water to over 400,000 residents from Moanalua to Hawai'i Kai; and

Whereas, The tanks are now corroding underground and the Navy is unable to properly remediate the corrosion of the thin quarter-inch steel liners where they are encased by porous concrete, leaving the tanks to inevitably corrode and crumble; and

Whereas, Since 1943, the facility has recorded at least 73 fuel leaks from these tanks and connecting pipelines and infrastructure totaling about 200,000 gallons and yet Red Hill has escaped major scrutiny until 2014, when an estimated 27,000 gallons of fuel leaked, since then groundwater and soil monitoring systems registered spikes in diesel and petroleum and

Whereas, Recent leaks in 2021 have caused jet fuel to enter the drinking water of nearby military housing residents causing illness to them and their pets; and

Whereas, The Department of Health (DOH) confirmed that the Navy's water system, which draws from the sole source aquifer near the Red Hill tank facility, contains levels of jet fuel and diesel range total petroleum hydrocarbons 350 times higher than state standards for safe drinking water; and

Whereas, The situation has deteriorated so much that a hearings officer has recently allowed the Sierra Club and the Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) to intervene as parties in protracted administrative proceedings between the Hawaii Department of Health and the Navy, because the Sierra Club and BWS assert that the DOH is inadequately protecting the public interest; and

Whereas, The presence of fuel-laced water in or near the Navy's wells also means that the drinking water of the entire southern O'ahu region — 400,000 people from Moanalua to Hawai'i Kai — is also at risk, because the Navy and the Honolulu Board of Water Supply pump their water from the same aquifer and there is no natural barrier preventing the Navy's contamination from migrating across the Hālawa Valley to the civilian water sources; and

Whereas, The Navy has long ago already shuttered its other fuel storage facilities across the country built in the same era as the Red Hill underground fuel facilities; and

Whereas, The U.S. Military has had a long history of poor stewardship of Hawai'i's natural and cultural resources throughout the State, including littering lands with unexploded ordnance and toxic waste, loss of cultural and historic sites and endangered native species; and

Whereas, On December 6, 2021, Governor Ige, through the DOH, ordered the Navy to suspend all operations at Red Hill, build a water treatment facility, and provide a plan within 30 days for emptying the tanks pursuant to the DOH Emergency Order (Docket No. 21-UST-EA-02) however, the Navy has challenged the order, a position that could lead to a prolonged legal battle; and

Whereas, The administrative hearings officer ruled on December 27, 2021 that the Navy's conduct creates an "imminent peril to human health and safety or the environment" and upheld the DOH order; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the State Central Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i urges the DOH to uphold the hearings officer's ruling, that the Navy comply forthwith with the ruling without further dispute, and that the Navy undertake a complete and immediate emergency shutdown, including but not limited to the immediate, complete, and permanent draining of all of the fuel storage tanks at Red Hill and the use of temporary fuel storage facilities at a significant distance away from the aquifer, including use of oil tankers if need be; and be it further

Resolved, That the State Central Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i urges full third-party assessment of the Red Hill facility for the permanent removal of the U.S. Navy Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility underground storage tanks from their current location and their relocation or the establishment of other fuel-storage facilities at an area where they would pose no threat to O'ahu's drinking water; and be it further

Resolved, That the State Central Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i requests the Hawai'i delegation to the United States Congress to urge in the strongest possible terms and to employ their best efforts and their close relationships with the Biden Administration and with Congressional leadership to ensure that the Navy attach the highest priority to removing the underground fuel storage tanks from the Red Hill area and place them in a more environmentally benign location and to ensure that adequate funding is appropriated to make such relocation take place at the earliest practicable date; and be it

Ordered, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of the Navy, the Commander of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, the Administrator and Regional Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the members of Hawai'i's Congressional delegation, the Governor of the State of Hawai'i, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, the Director of the Hawai'i State Department of Health, all members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, the Mayor and all members of the City Council of Honolulu, the Honolulu Board of Water Supply, and the Sierra Club Hawai'i Chapter.

My name is Jun Shin. I am a Senior at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, water drinker, and a member of the Environmental Justice Action Committee for the Young Progressives Demanding Action (YPDA). YPDA advocates for public policies that reflect the values of young people throughout the State of Hawai'i. YPDA is in **STRONG SUPPORT** of **Bill 48 CD1 (2021)**, Relating to Underground Storage Tanks.

It's deeply frustrating that after years of struggle, a struggle that YPDA is deeply honored to have been a part of, those in power, including the United States Navy has allowed its underground fuel tank facilities in Red Hill to contaminate and shut down the Aiea-Hālawa wells, with the Hālawa shaft being in danger of being shut down permanently. We now live with the reality of water rationing in the future. The BWS Hālawa shaft will be shut down until fuel is removed from the tanks and may not reopen for years to come. This shaft was a source of water for South O'ahu from Hālawa to Maunalua. The BWS has advised that mandatory water conservation measures will now need to be in place in the summer of 2022. This did not have to be this way, but if there is a silver lining in this crisis, it is that more and more of Hawai'i's people are rising up to ask questions, coming out to demonstrations, testifying, and becoming ever more empowered. It is we the people who will protect our water for present and future generations, we will be the ones to shut down Red Hill.

Bill 48 is critical regulation that will require any operator of underground storage tanks with a capacity of 100,000 gallons or more (Red Hill is way way more) to go through the process of obtaining a permit from the City & County of Honolulu, a point in time in which critical questions can be asked and answered, information submitted for the permit can be reviewed,

etc. Moving forward, we cannot trust the Navy to protect our water. After all, a whistleblower also told the Department of Health in September that Navy officials provided false testimony and withheld information about the full extent of the Facility's infrastructure, including connected pipelines, as well as "historical records of corrosion issues, including holes in tanks" at its Red Hill fuel facility during legal proceedings. This bill also makes clear that no permit be granted unless the applicant proves that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment. To be very clear, Red Hill already has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. It needs to be shut down safely NOW for the health of our people and our water, and it should never be allowed to hurt another community again. We urge this committee to recommend that the Mayor place the Board of Water Supply as the department with the authority to implement and enforce the permit. The Board of Water Supply has been one of the only government agencies consistently speaking out for all these years for our water and for the water drinkers of O'ahu, they with the support and watchful eyes of the community should play an important role in the decision making process moving forward.

Passing this bill into law is important. Not because it will solve this crisis the day after the Mayor signs it into law, but it will give us another important tool in our toolbox. Allowing us to work together with our government, using the law as leverage to demand that the Navy shut down Red Hill. Thank you for taking up this important issue. Young Progressives Demanding Action is in **STRONG SUPPORT** of **Bill 48 CD1 (2021)** and we are calling on its passage. Please pass this bill and stand with us in the streets.

The Windward Coalition strongly supports Bill 48 and CD-1 relating to underground fuel storage tank regulations the permanent removal and relocation of the underground storage tanks at Red Hill.

The Windward Coalition (WC) is a voluntary community action group with the mission of improving the quality of life of Windward residents by addressing environmental issues affecting our neighborhoods. We are not affiliated with or part of any political party, government entity or other organization.

Written Testimony While the windward aquifer is not immediately directly impacted by the Red Hill fuel leakage, all the aquifers are linked underground (refer to BWS Ernest Lau's description of the aquifers as underground sponges). Pollution can seep from one aquifer into another, threatening the quality of the water supply elsewhere. Furthermore, if the aquifer below Honolulu is not drinkable, the BWS will be forced to draw water from other aquifers and ration water, as the supply of water will not be sufficient to support the island's population.

This is a major crisis which requires immediate action to salvage Oahu's aquifer and drinking water for the present and the future. The leakage has been a very serious problem for many years and the patchwork repairs have not fixed the problem. In fact, the water is now sickening military and island residents. Petroleum ingestion is a very serious health hazard: our residents are being poisoned.

What other disasters are needed for the Navy to defuel, shut down, and relocate the tanks?

Without safe drinking water, our island's ability to support our population, the military bases and national security interests is in very serious jeopardy. Yes, relocating the fuel tanks will be very expensive. Other states in similar situations have shut down leaking fuel tanks, ensuring local environmental security without risking National Security. The Navy must be Pono and take responsible, immediate action to stop further damage to the aquifers and to our people.

The Navy is heading down a path that will soon be irreversible if the tanks aren't permanently shut down and relocated. Healthy drinking water is fundamental to the very essence of our life on this island. Our island cannot support or coexist with National Security interests if the island's main source of fresh drinking water is polluted with fuel. We, the NHPI 3R Team, write to support Bill 48 and urge the Honolulu City Council to pass this measure as a critical protection against any further loss of life or harm from the damage caused by the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility. The history of spills, leaks, violations of environmental safety regulation, contesting of violations by the Navy, withholding of critical information by the Navy, and most recently, active endangerment of military personnel and families, shutdown of the Red Hill water shaft without appropriate and timely notification to the Board of Water Supply, shutdown of the Hālawa water shaft, and the dismissal of the Emergency Order to immediately defuel the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility each stand as actions that did not center safety and health. Further details about the missteps and failures reflected this history are available widely for public review. We contend that the evidence appears to converge on two conclusions: first, that the only solution at this time is immediate defueling of the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility; second, that the context of placing the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility above a single source aquifer was never safe – not in 1940 and certainly not in 2021.

We are the Native Hawaiian & Pacific Islander Hawai'i COVID-19 Response Recovery Resilience (NHPI 3R) Team, a collective of over 60 Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander organizations established in 2020 with more than 100 active volunteers who are health experts. Our statewide network, in alignment with the national NHPI Response Team (now the National Association of Pasifika Organizations), initially convened to work in various components of addressing COVID-19 for Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders through a variety of vehicles. As the immediate issues in COVID-19 have brought more attention to the disparities facing our communities, our work has expanded to prioritize health equity work by addressing systemic issues and root causes for the health of NHPI families who makeup more than 27% of the Hawai'i population according to the U.S. Census 2020.

As public health and popoulation health experts, community advocates, and trusted leaders, we emphasize the need for actions such as Bill 48 and Resolution 21-276, which contribute towards protecting the communities that are too often overlooked or left behind in public policy but bear the most burden from public health and safety failures. We fully support and applaud the Honolulu City Council for calling a special meeting to address the time-sensitive environmental disaster that is Red Hill, which reflects the immediacy emphasized by grassroots and community-based organizations. Everyone needs clean water in order to live. Our precious island home provides natural resources that need intentional, thoughtful stewardship and fierce protection. The NHPI 3R Team underscroes that water is an essential determinant to human life and collective health.

We support the pressing need to defuel Red Hill immediately as the sole solution and the passage of Bill 48 as a step towards that solution.

These tanks have leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since they were constructed and the Navy's own risk assessment from 2018 concluded that the probability of an acute leak of between 1,000 and 30,000 gallons (independent of any earthquake risk) over the next ten years is 96%. The Navy cannot prove that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment.

Written Testimony

Approximately 93,000 people living in military housing have been unable to use their water for several weeks. Water will not be restored, and those who were displaced will not be able to return home, for at least six to eight weeks, if not longer. If the Navy water system is further compromised, our housing crisis will mushroom.

DOH said that a water sample taken from the Red Hill drinking water shaft on December 5 confirmed the water is contaminated with "high levels" of petroleum and gasoline. The sample detected total petroleum hydrocarbons diesel range organics levels 350 times above the DOH Environmental Action Level (EAL) for drinking water, and gasoline range organics more than 66 times the DOH EAL.

The Red Hill facility – the fragile, antiquated fuel tanks and supporting systems – has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Shutting down Red Hill immediately and entirely is the only way to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

On behalf of Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI), I write in strong support of Bill 48, proposed CD1, which would protect public health and O'ahu's clean drinking water supply by requiring any operator of underground storage tanks with a capacity of 100,000 gallons or more to obtain a permit from the City and stating that no permit will be granted unless the applicant proves that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment.

HIPHI is alarmed by the recent confirmation of petroleum in our water supply. Fresh, clean drinking water is a precious resource, with access to clean drinking water being a basic human right that is "essential for the enjoyment of life and all human rights."

While the petroleum has only been found in the Navy's water system, it gets water from the same aquifer that provides water to primary drinking water resources for metropolitan O'ahu. For years, advocates and organizations like the Sierra Club have warned about the need to protect our drinking water, as the Red Hill Fuel Tank facility sits only 100 feet above the aquifer that supplies water to over 400,000 people, from Hālawa to Hawai'i Kai. The Red Hill facility has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Closing down the Red Hill facility immediately and entirely is the only way to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

The severity of this water crisis has led the Hawai'i State Department of Health to issue an emergency order instructing the Navy to drain its Red Hill fuel tanks and correct deficiencies at the fuel facility before seeking state permission to resume operation. Further, the Honolulu Board of Water Supply shut down three of its drinking water wells last month over concerns that jet fuel spilled by the Navy might contaminate its drinking water system. Those wells may never reopen again and could result in water shortages for O'ahu residents.

This public health crisis was preventable, and we urge the Navy and the State to take swift action to protect our water supply. Clean water is essential for life, and access to clean, safe drinking water being a basic human right.

The Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement (CNHA), a member-based 501(c)(3) non-profit organization with a mission to enhance the cultural, economic, political, and community development of Native Hawaiians, <u>STRONGLY SUPPORTS</u> Bill 48 Proposed CD1, which seeks to resolve the crisis that currently threatens an aquifer that supplies fresh drinking water to nearly half of O'ahu's residents.

The Navy's Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility has leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since 1940, including recent leaks that have contaminated the Southern O'ahu Basal Aquifer. After the November 2021 leaks, the Honolulu Board of Water Supply (HBWS) was forced to shut down its Hālawa Shaft, Hālawa Well and 'Aiea Well as a precautionary measure to prevent the fuel contamination from migrating to the public water system. An extended or permanent shutdown of these three critical HBWS wells would trigger mandatory water conservation measures during dry periods. Moreover, the unknown levels of fuel contamination in the Southern O'ahu Basal Aquifer could have potentially devastating impacts on Hawai'i's economy, especially if the contamination is so great that the HBWS is unable to approve new wells to support new housing developments.

Native Hawaiian traditions reflect the importance of fresh water for survival on an isolated archipelago in the middle of the vast Pacific. For example, the Hawaiian word for wealth is waiwai, which is the duplication of the word for water, wai. Numerous oli (chants), mele (song) and 'ōlelo noe'au describe the cultural significance of water. The famous saying "Ola i ka wai" extols the life-giving power of water.

Hawai'i's local leaders must take immediate action to protect the fresh water that supports our community. Bill 48 would provide the City enhanced authority to regulate underground storage tanks through a proposed permitting process.



In closing, we urge the Honolulu City Council to approve this bil to protect Oʻahu's lifegiving waters. If not permanently shut down, cleaned up and removed, the Red Hill fuel tanks
will continue to endanger not only the water source that serves 400,000 Oʻahu residents but

They really need to think of the best solution and I don't believe it's flushing it out into the streams that leads out into our ocean killing the marine life and the food that many of us gather for our 'Ohana. It is a tragedy that will become worse if they do not STOP the use of these underground storage tanks and call for more accountability regarding tanks such as these!

The Red Hill facility – the fragile, antiquated fuel tanks and supporting systems – has a long
