Aloha e Chair Andria Tupola, Vice Chair Carol Fukunaga, and members of the committee on Executive Matters and Legal Affairs,

My name is Kristen and I'm a resident of the Punchbowl area. I support Resolution 22-29 relating to the police commission and its membership.

I was born and raised on Oʻahu and have been privileged to not have severely negative personal experiences with law enforcement, but by paying attention to others in our community I have become more aware of over-policing, excessive use of force, corruption, and a lack of accountability and transparency within the Honolulu Police Department (HPD). An institution that is funded by our tax dollars, given permission to enforce laws, and armed with deadly weapons, should have strong civilian oversight that is reflective of the community if their purpose is public safety.

The Honolulu Police Commission (HPC) has the potential to provide that oversight to increase transparency and accountability from the police department, but it will really depend on who makes up the Commission—the membership of the Commission.

I support Resolution 22-29 as it would allow for a wider range of voices and perspectives on the HPC. It would also improve transparency and collaboration between HPD, HPC, Honolulu City Council, and Oahu residents, resulting in greater government efficacy and trust.

We must improve the balance of power within these bodies to strengthen oversight, build public trust, and advance public safety for all.

Resolution 22-29 was introduced alongside three other resolutions with similar goals:

- 1. Resolution 22-28 re: The Honolulu Police Commission
- 2. Resolution 22-30 re: The Police Department and the Chief of Police
- 3. Resolution 22-31 re: Investigations and Reports of the Honolulu Police Commission

I hope these resolutions will also be scheduled for second hearings so the public can have the opportunity to share their thoughts.
