Aloha Chair Waters and members of the Honolulu City Council,

Mahalo for the opportunity to submit testimony on behalf of Hale Kipa, Inc., in strong support of Council Resolution CR-220 Resolution 22-197. Since 2002, Hale Kipa has leased the City's Special Needs Housing site at 1322 Haloa Drive in Foster Village. We seek to renew this lease with the City & County of Honolulu to continue to provide housing and a skill-building program to young women, ages 18-24, transitioning out of foster care. We screen all potential residents and rule out those who are in psychiatric crisis. Placements are voluntary. Those who enter the program agree to abide by program rules and expectations, which include continuing their education or locating employment. Hale Kipa employs a Live-In Resident Advisor who is there evenings, overnights, and most of the weekend days. A Case Manager works with the residents on a weekly basis. Hale Kipa's Facilities Manager ensures that the home is kept in good repair.

Founded in 1970, Hale Kipa has focused on the needs of children and youth and has grown from its humble beginnings as an emergency shelter for females on Oahu to become a statewide, nationally accredited agency with 20 programs responsive to the ongoing needs of Hawaii's high-risk youth and young adults, ages 5-27, and their families. Hale Kipa's vision is that youth and families will be able to thrive at their fullest potential while being socially responsible humans; its mission is to provide opportunities and environments that strengthen and encourage youth, their families, and communities to actualize their potential and social responsibility. We accomplish this through a

Our purpose is to 'catch' youth whenever we meet them to assist them rediscover their strengths, realign their trajectory, identify dreams and goals, and assist them on the path to healing and success.
