CONFIRMING THE MAYOR'S APPOINTEES TO SERVE ON THE OAHU HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the executive reorganization powers set forth in Section 4-202 of the Revised Charter of the City and County of Honolulu 1973 (Amended 2017 Edition), as amended ("Charter"), the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu may propose to the City Council ("Council") that the duties and functions of existing departments or agencies of the executive branch be changed and that executive departments or agencies be rearranged; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor retains broad and flexible powers to effectuate an executive reorganization under Section 4-202 of the Charter, which reorganization shall become effective upon approval by the Council or sixty days after transmittal to the Council unless rejected by a two-thirds vote of the Council's entire membership in accordance with the terms of said provision; and

WHEREAS, on November 22, 2022, the Mayor transmitted a draft resolution, introduced as Resolution 22-279, which proposed to initiate amendments to the Charter relating to the creation of an Oahu Historic Preservation Commission to "preserve, promote, and develop the historical resources of the city", and

WHEREAS, after sixty days, Resolution 22-279 became effective without further action from the Council; and

WHEREAS, under establishment of the Commission, the Charter states that "the commission shall consist of nine members appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the council"; and

WHEREAS, the Charter further states that "the council may, by ordinance:

- (a) Establish qualifications, in addition to that set forth in Section 13-103 of this charter, for appointees to the commission; and
- (b) Assign additional powers, duties, and functions to the commission relating to the preservation and perpetuation of Oahu's historic resources and may include in the ordinances reasonable restrictions or conditions on the commission's exercise of such powers, duties, and functions"; and

WHEREAS, § 3-10.3, Revised Ordinances of Honolulu 2021, as amended ("ROH"), establishes an Oahu Historic Preservation Commission ("Commission") consisting of nine members; and



WHEREAS, § 3-10.7, sets forth the powers and duties of the Commission; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Charter Section 13-103, the members of the Commission shall serve for staggered five-year terms; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to § 3-10.3 (b), the members of the Commission are appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council ("Council") and shall be appointed from among professionals and persons with special interest in the following disciplines:

- (1) Architecture;
- (2) History;
- (3) Archaeology;
- (4) Planning;
- (5) Architectural history;
- (6) Hawaiian culture;
- (7) Anthropology;
- (8) Ethnography; and
- (9) Sociology;

provided that the commission shall include an expert in native Hawaiian culture issues and concerns and in archaeology. All members of the commission shall have professional, educational, or demonstrated work experience, or a combination thereof, in the disciplines listed in subdivisions (1) through (9). Members also shall reflect an ethnic diversity to carry out the purposes of the commission to identify, protect, preserve, and restore historic properties and artifacts of all ethnic cultures. The mayor shall solicit lists of two or more persons, recommended by the community and professional organizations, and appropriate ethnic organizations dedicated to preserving unique cultural heritages, including but not limited to the Center for Hawaiian Studies at the University of Hawaii Manoa, the Hawaii Civic clubs, the Honolulu Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, and others, for consideration in making commission appointments. commission members shall have a demonstrated interest, competence, and knowledge in historic preservation; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has solicited recommendations from the following organizations: Hawaiʻinuiākea School for Hawaiian Knowledge — University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa, Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, AIA (American Institute of Architects) Honolulu, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement, Hui lwi Kuamoʻo, Archaeological Institute of America — Hawaii (Honolulu), Historic Hawaiʻi Foundation and Bishop Museum; and

WHEREAS, by Mayor's letter dated March 28, 2023, the Mayor has appointed nine members with staggered terms to the Commission; and

WHEREAS, Charter Section 13-103 requires that each appointee to the Commission be a duly registered voter of the City; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City and County of Honolulu has reviewed the qualifications and character and finds that each of the appointees qualifies to serve on the Commission; now, therefore,


