The Hawaii Health and Harm Reduction (HHHRC) Center stronly supports Bill 28 which would support Naloxone in the City and County of Honolulu's bars and nightclubs. In 2022 more people died of drug overodose than ever recorded in Hawaii, with a huge increase in fentanyl related overdoses. Naloxone is very safe (the FDA just make it over the counter) and can prevent death from opioid overdose. We have had deaths in our establishements that could be prevented with this bill.

HHHRC's mission is to reduce harm, promote health, create wellness and fight stigma in Hawaii and the Pacific. We focus our efforts on those disproportionately affected by social determinants of health, including but not limited to: people living with and/or affected by HIV, hepatitis, substance use, and the transgender, LGBQ and the Native Hawaiian communities.

HHHRC is willing to help provide training and dissemination of naloxone as resources allow – we have been doing so for the past 7 years and have been the primary agency in Hawaii dedicated to getting naloxone in spaces where it can save lives.

Hawai'i Public Health Institute ⁱ (HIPHI) respectfully submits testimony in **support** of Bill 28 Relating to Naloxone with suggested clarifications. This measure would require that certain classes, kinds, and categories of liquor-licensed establishments maintain a specified amount of naloxone on their premises; and that managers be trained in the proper administration of naloxone.

This policy is an important one to address the increasing deaths from opiods in our communities. We ask you to consider amending the bill by using the term "appropriate personnel" instead of "manager" for those who should receive training, as sometimes a manager may not be on the premises. Furthermore, it should be clear that no one will be held liable for providing or adminstering this life saving medicine. It is only effective if used; therefore, we want to ensure there are no barriers to that use.

Naloxone is a highly effective opiod receptor antagonist, which can counter the effects of an overdose when administered immediately. The life-saving effect of this medicine has saved people's lives. It is so effective and safe that the FDA has approved it for over the counter sales.

Thank you for considering our testimony this measure that supports public health.
