Aloha Council Members:

Please faithfully discharge the duties of your office regardless of personal considerations and put resolutions 23-081 and 23-082 on the council's agenda to be voted on by each council member. The public interest should always be your primary concern. Moreover, the public deserves the right to know where each of you stands.

The Salary Commission has done a great disservice to the public when it voted for excessive pay salaries. The public has to pay for these unwarranted raises for the mayor and other top-paying city employees by paying more taxes and fees or by sacrificing funding for public services and programs. This is not the time for raises when the public is struggling to make ends meet with higher food costs and increased property taxes etc.

By amending the bill to remove an increase in salaries, these savings could be used for the benefit of the public such as basic public services that have been lacking. For example, keeping our streets clean by removing trash/ bulk items and cutting the weeds. The city has neglected these two basic services. There are so many other public uses for this money instead of paying for raises that benefit only the individual.

Benefits and perks of the job etc. were not included as compensation when determining raises. In addition, the salary commission only decides whether or not a raise should be given and how much it will give. It does not offer job analysis or examine job performance, nor does it offer solutions to resolve pay inversions or address the widening pay gap between the least and highest-paid employees. I believe that pay inversions can be prevented not only by increasing salaries but, preferably by establishing salary caps, changing job descriptions and duties, and by abolishing jobs.

I believe that the salaries of the city's top-paying employees are overinflated and should be kept in check. Salaries for hard-to-fill positions that require specialized skills and training should be paid more but those positions should be analyzed individually in order to make an adequate assessment.

I would like to note that the mayor is currently being paid about \$20k more than the governor of the state of Hawaii. A raise will increase that gap to more than \$43k.

Please amend the Bill to remove salary increases or include resolutions 23-081 and 23-082 on the Council's Agenda.

Aloha Chair Cordero, Vice Chair Weyer and Committee Members,

The Hawaiian Humane Society is in strong support of the amendments to Bill 11, CD1, proposed by Council Chair Tommy Waters and Budget Chair Cordero.

We appreciate the Council's careful review of the City and County of Honolulu's funding priorities. Restoring the administration's budget request for the Department of Customer Services Motor Vehicle, Licensing and Permits division will enable more robust access to animal services for the communities of Central and West O'ahu. We are grateful for the City's support of Hawaiian Humane's historic expansion to two campuses with the opening of a new animal shelter in 'Ewa Beach this very weekend on May 20.

The proposed amendments also support a budget request that increases the funding for the veterinary clinics that provide low and no-fee spay/neuter services for owned animals and Free-Roaming cats. We appreciate that the administration and the Council recognize that it is the best interests of our community to humanely reduce unplanned pet breeding, as well as the number of cats living outdoors.

We urge the Council to pass Bill 11 with the proposed amendments to support the work done by the Hawaiian Humane Society as the City's animal services contractor, as well as the other vital functions of City government funded by this measure. Mahalo for your consideration. May 12, 2023

## **RE: Operating Budget amendment (Bill 11, proposed CD2)**

Aloha Chair Cordero and members of the committee,

Re-use Hawai'i is a non-profit organization working to create a long-term solution to Hawai'i's waste management challenges by diverting building materials from the landfill and (re)cultivating a circular economy in Hawai'i.

We strongly support the proposed budget amendment related to a pilot program at the Kapa'a Quarry Transfer Station to collect and redistribute reusable construction materials and household items (page 72). Diverting material from transfer stations is a proven method of reducing waste and cultivating a circular economy for our community.

Forty-two percent of our waste stream is construction and demolition materials. Much of this material can be reused and recycled. Keeping material in use provides the following benefits:

- Reduces our reliance on landfills
- Generates a low-cost community resource
- Reduces carbon emissions by avoiding the extraction, manufacturing, and shipping associated with the creation of new products

Re-use Hawai'i is interested in providing a proposal to operate the collection site. We are prepared to collect data and provide a report on the tonnage diverted, donor engagement, and other metrics of success.

We strongly support this budget amendment and look forward to being a resource for this initiative.
