Aloha Committee Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Council:

I "oppose" City Council of Honolulu Bill 039(23) in all of its written forms: Bill 039(23); Bill 039(23), CD1 – 07-25-23 BUD; and proposed draft Bill039(23), CD1, Proposed CD2-TW1.

I applaud the significant amount of expended time of certain persons who have provided detailed impacts of landfills within communities, specifically the Leeward Coast. I respect those opinions and their support for Bill 39. Although I oppose this bill, I hope my points of view will be given the same review and respect.

I oppose this bill because I don't believe the City Council has taken the necessary time to address any and all solutions or all impacts to the community. Per reference C, there has been a landfill in this area since 1940 stretching all the way to Kaena Point:

30 Acres Waianae Land Fill 1942-1989
8 Acres Saki Moru Construction and Demo 1980-1991
28 Acres Keawaula Dump 1940-1950
113 Acres PVT #1 Construction and Demo (present)
75 Acres PVT #2 Construction and Demo (present)
200 Acres Waimanalo Gulch (present)
Lualualei Transmitter Site (acreage unknown) 1948-1960s

The State Senate and State House passed resolutions: references A and B, specifically stating the negative health impacts of landfills in close proximity to residents. Now, the City Council of Honolulu is considering passing a bill, reference D to exempt property taxes. Acknowledging the negativity and health impacts of landfills, yet only focuses on PVT Construction and Demolition Landfill and not Waimanalo Gulch Municipal Solid Waste Landfill (WGSL). For years it has been noted regarding the impacts of landfills within residential areas, yet the State and City failed to address those impacts then.

In 2004 (may have been 2005), the City Council had a town hall meeting for which I attended regarding Oahu landfill and trash. At this meeting several options for landfill solutions were discussed and advertised to council members. One such solution was Plasma Arc Gasification (PAG). This technology is not new but has the capability to reduce the islands landfill footprint significantly, produce electricity, provide byproducts for cement and asphalt, and most importantly it's better for the environment. If you review reference E, you will see that the benefit of PAG outweighs any of our current in place methods but keeps H-Power. Yet at that time the city council failed to take PAG technology into consideration. Roughly 20 years later the City and County of Honolulu is still debating the current landfill and a future landfill site without consideration of a technology that meets the demand and requirement for the island that would negate a need for this bill.

The Planning Commission (PC) has yet to approve the WGSL location identification extension. It is now nine months passed a required December 31, 2022 new landfill site identification deadline. However, at the most recent PC meeting that I attended, City Environmental indicated their new landfill site search includes potential federal lands, an ask to modify ACT 73 (established the 0.5 no landfill buffer zone), and IMMINENT DOMAIN.

It concerns me that the Leeward Coast hasn't been given any legal documentation by the City and County that no new landfills will be built in our area. It concerns me that this bill has inappropriate language which is quoted as follows,

"The Council further finds that the establishment of these new landfills is of critical importance and that a real property tax exemption for residents in close proximity to the new facilities may provide a reasonable incentive for local homeowners."

What incentive is the council trying to sell the community? Presently a property tax exemption for those on Department of Hawaiian Homelands (DHHL) would be \$300.00. Others in the area not on DHHL lands pay on average \$2500.00 per year. Do those dollar values make it acceptable for a person's health and wellbeing? Essentially, my impression is the City is buying off residents to keep a landfill in operation in close proximity to residents. It further opens the door to modify ACT 73 and keep a landfill in our community. What does the council and/or city know that is not being advertised to community members? Is the next landfill going to be in Kahala, Hawaii Kai, or Lanikai where properties pay \$5000.00 or more yearly in property taxes? Again, what does the city and/or council know that isn't being advertised?

I suggest the council pause, discuss more appropriate solutions to our landfill issues. I further suggest that if the council is going to continue with a bill in such a manner, that the council provide alternatives outside of full property tax exemptions such as housing upgrades (ex: double pane windows, ensure all homes are sealed appropriately, provide filtered air conditioning units). Consider providing healthcare options or subsidize healthcare cost for health issues attributed to landfills.

Finally, please consider the "Pandora's Box" you will open if approving this bill. Consider those residents affected by other landfills that were in use on the leeward coast (see above), will you also compensate them? What about the Ala Wai Canal, those next to sewage treatment plants, the class action law suits that may come against the city and state. Remember, you are now on record along with the state that you have knowingly allowed landfill operations to operate in residential communities. Knowingly allowed the residents of the Leeward Coast to be exposed to potential toxins affecting their health, safety, and well-being.

Chair Cordero, Vice Chair Weyer, and Members of the Committee:

The United Public Workers, AFSCME Local 646, AFL-CIO ("UPW") is the exclusive bargaining representative for approximately 14,000 public employees, which includes blue-collar, non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 1 and institutional, health, and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawai'i and each of the four counties.

UPW supports Bill 39, CD1 (2023), which establishes a real property tax exemption for certain real property located near an active landfill. More specifically, this measure exempts residents who live within a one-mile radius of an active landfill from real property taxes and from the assessment of the minimum real property tax under §8-11.1.

While this measure would address the Integrated Solid Waste Management Facility operated by the PVT Land Company, Ltd. and the Waimānalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill, Bill 39, CD1 would also exempt those residents who would be impacted by future landfill sites.

We humbly ask that the Council to support Hawai'i's working families who are negatively impacted by these landfill areas by passing Bill 39, CD1.

Aloha Chair Waters, Vice Chair Kia'āina, and Members of the Council

I am Darius Kila, and I am the current Representative for House District 44, which encompasses Honokai Hale, Nānākuli and Ma'ili.

I am in STRONG SUPPORT of Bill 39 (2023) CD1, as it directly impacts the residents in my district. The Waimanalo Landfill, which is operated by PVT Land Company, Ltd., is located in my district and has residential properties surrounding it, and is of great concern to me and my constituents. There is well established scientific support that having residential properties/homes in close proximity (up to 2 miles away) to landfills have negative health impact for residents residing in those properties.

The impact to those who are living within one-half mile of an active landfill are impacted even more. Abutting the Waimanalo Landfill is a predominantly Native Hawaiian community, which has been negatively impacted by the close proximity of the landfill—the residents have a lifespan that is 10 years lower than the state average of 82 years, and have the second- and third-lowest life expectancies in the entire state.

Additionally, living in such close proximity to the landfill creates a myriad of health problems for the residents, including but not limited to increased risk of reduced lung function, asthma, ataxia, paralysis, and lung cancer due to air pollution in their homes from unmitigated dust pollution from the landfill.

In addition to increased health problems, residents living in close proximity to landfills incur added expenses such as increased medical expenses, funeral expenses, and additional home repairs and repainting due to the unnatural build up of dust. The increased air pollution from the landfills also necessitates the installation and maintenance of an air filtration system.

While not curing the ills brought to neighboring residents of landfills, a real property tax exemption for certain properties located near an active landfill will ease the burden of these added residential, medical and living expenses incurred by these residents living within a 1-mile radius of an active landfill.

A property tax exemption should be made for residents who are living within a 1-mile radius of an active landfill. These residents are also affected by the pollutants from the landfill and will suffer from health problems. Continued and prolonged exposure to these pollutants, including inhalation of the gaseous emissions, will increase health problems, and could eventually lead to death.

This measure is similar to House Resolution (HR) 113 and House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 107, which I introduced during the 2023 Legislative Session; both HR113 and HCR107 were adopted by the House of Representatives and the Senate.

Subject: Testimony in Support of Bill 39 (2023) - Relating to Real Property Taxation

I would like to go on record to voice my support to the City Administration's draft of Bill 39 (2023) that proposes to exempt residential properties within a 0.5-mile radius of an active landfill to be exempt from real property taxes and from the assessment of the minimum real property tax. As proposed in Bill 39, this would allow residents living near a landfill to file for an exemption to continue upon the closure or relocation of an active landfill, for a period not to exceed 30 years.

This Bill would positively affect families living near the PVT Landfill, and remove a burden from already financially strained households. Exempting families from paying real property taxes would allow them to redirect their resources towards investing in their well-being and health, allowing them to also receive the appropriate health care to undo the damage that living near the landfill has done. According to the US Small Area Life Expectancy Estimates Project, the homesteads surrounding the landfills only live for an average of 72 years, compared to the Hawaii average of 82 years. There are multiple studies stating the adverse health affects of living near landfills, such as increased risk of cancer, birth defects, and various respiratory illnesses. I personally also have family members who have been affected by the landfills, and they have been suffering for decades with a variety of ailments ranging from skin diseases such as eczema, to heart, kidney and lung diseases.

I urge all members of the Honolulu City Council to stand in favor of Bill 39, and support the proposed exemption. By doing so, we can ensure a fair and equitable approach to taxation while taking essential steps to protect the well-being of our community members residing near active landfills. Thank you for this opportunity to share this testimony for the Honolulu City Council's consideration.

### Re - Support for Bill 39 - Relating to Real Property Tax

Aloha Chair Radiant Cordero and members of the committee:

Bill 39 before the Honolulu City Council aims to provide tax relief to those in Nānākuli and Mā'ili affected by PVT Landfill and any other community affected by our waste processing and landfilling. I support tax relief for those that reside in proximity of an active construction and demolition landfill. In addition, I urge the committee members to consider, as a separate matter, a host community benefits package program similar to that of the Kekaha Community Benefits Fund on Kaua'i for those communities disproportionately impacted by O'ahu's waste management, to include *at least* Nānākuli, Mā'ili, Kapolei, Makakilo, and Honokai Hale.

From Mā'ili and residing in Kapolei, my name is Kamuela Werner. I graduated from Nānākuli High School, hold a Bachelors of Science in Environmental Management as well as a Masters in Public Health from the University of Hawai'i. I have worked at the Department of Native Hawaiian Health at the John A. Burns School of Medicine as a Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander health disparities researcher, as a Native Hawaiian Congressional fellow for Senator Mazie Hirono in D.C., and now work as a teacher and farmer at Nānākuli High and Intermediate School.

Before moving to Mā'ili, I grew up in a multi-generational Native Hawaiian household on Mōhihi Street in Nānākuli. The Lualualei plain was my backyard where, at the time, you could see straight through to the base of Pu'u Heleakalā, the sacred and storied place of our ancestor Māui. Now we see "mauna 'ōpala" as the keiki call it, created by the PVT Land Company. Today, I speak on behalf of my 'ohana that live, work, or go to school in the shadow of "trash mountain".

We respectfully ask you to support all three. Why? To advance environmental justice for our community who are victims of environmental racism and to help resource our neighbors and neighborhoods to adequately address the ills of waste management in our communities.

On O'ahu, nearly all landfilling, waste-to-energy processing, and recycling of O'ahu's waste occurs in West O'ahu in areas with high concentrations of Native Hawaiians at Waimānalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill adjacent to the Honokai Hale and Makakilo communities, H-POWER adjacent to the Kapolei community, and where the H-POWER ash and much of the Construction and Demolition waste passes through Makakilo, Kapolei, and Honokai Hale to either end up at

Waimanalo Gulch or in Nānākuli at PVT Landfill (2019 *Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan*).

In Act 73, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2020, the state of Hawai'i established Hawai'i's statewide "buffer zone" law which includes a prohibition of landfills one-half mile between the edge of waste or disposal activity and the nearest residential, school, or hospital property line while the Hawai'i State "buffer zone" law is a great step towards minimizing the impact of landfills, it does not address the plight of the thousands of our neighbors that live next to landfills whom suffer a decrease in quality of life, depressed property valuation, and experience a myriad of health problems including increased risk of reduced lung function, asthma, ataxia, paralysis, and lung cancer as their home air quality has been negatively impacted by such operations.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention/National Center for Health Statistics in the U.S. Small-Area Life Expectancy Estimates Project based in part on U.S. census data, the census tracts that include Nānākuli Homestead and the neighborhoods of Auyoung Homestead Road and Mōhihi Street have the 2nd and 3rd lowest life expectancies in the State. Our communities' life expectancy is 8 to 10 years less than the State average of 82 years. Immediately surrounding these communities, the life expectancy jumps between 4 and 6 years from the backside of Lualualei Valley behind the Wai'anae Coast Comprehensive Center, to Ko'olina, Honokai Hale, and Makakilo. Something is not pono.

Current and available public health studies associate living in close proximity to a landfill of 1 to 4 miles with adverse pregnancy outcomes, increases in infant low birth weights, increases in the risk of birth defects, self-reported headaches, sleepiness, respiratory and central nervous system problems, psychological conditions, and gastrointestinal issues. (See Health effects of residence near hazardous waste landfill sites: a review of epidemiologic literature, Environmental Health Perspectives, 2000; Health effects associated with the disposal of solid waste in landfills and incinerators in populations living in surrounding areas: a systematic review, The International Journal of Public Health, 2013). As a Construction and Demolition landfill in specific, the current PVT landfill contains tons of gypsum drywall which breaks down to produce hydrogen sulfide (H2S) gas (See Hydrogen sulfide generation in simulated construction and demolition debris landfills: impact of waste composition. The Journal of the Air & Waste Management Association, 2006). Residential exposure to H2S within 3.1 miles of a landfill is associated with lung cancer deaths as well as with death, disease and hospitalizations from respiratory illnesses (Morbidity and mortality of people who live close to municipal waste landfills: a multisite cohort study, International Journal of Epidemiology, 2016). Using the US Census 2017 ACS 5-Year Population Estimates for Nānākuli and Mā'ili, it is estimated that over 18,000 residents live within 3.1 miles of the PVT landfill and are potentially exposed daily to H2S in specific, and other landfill gasses and debris. In emergency situations, the State and City and County of Honolulu governments can place, and have placed, materials from disaster cleanups into PVT landfill.

The Hawai'i Department of Health (HDOH) has never clarified that there is no risk to the public for living in proximity to landfills in general, or the current or proposed PVT landfill in

specific, especially within 3.1 miles. Further, HDOH has never reviewed the findings of independent studies which say that there is no risk to public health from landfills in general or from the current or proposed PVT landfills in specific, especially to the thousands of people that live, work, and play within a 3.1-mile radius of landfill operations. In fact, according to the PVT 2019 Draft Environmental Impact Statement, the only HDOH air monitoring station that measures H2S is located in Puna on Hawai'i Island. HDOH given the current regulations for landfills, has been unable to adequately protect the public health, despite kama'āina testimony presented since the 1980s, voicing concerns over the adverse health impacts of living and working in close proximity to landfills both in general and with regard to the operations and plans of PVT in specific. Lastly, it is not clear if the permit requirements issued by HDOH or the Department of Planning and Permitting of the City and County of Honolulu are being enforced by HDOH and the City and County of Honolulu.

As a Native Hawaiian Congressional fellow who worked in the Office of Sen. Mazie Hirono, I gained a greater understanding of the purpose and value of governmental policies, which are in part, to protect the health and safety of the public. The policies that regulate our landfills today are incomplete, because communities are still at risk, our communities of Nānākuli and Mā'ili, Kapolei, Honokai Hale, and Makakilo are at risk. According to the EPA, environmental justice is the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income, with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies. I argue, the current regulations and policies that allow PVT to operate a landfill in the heart of Nānākuli and Mā'ili communities are racist towards Native Hawaiians and/or Pacific Islands and prejudiced towards working families with low to medium incomes. Today, we can take a step towards environmental justice for all communities.

I urge the City Council Budget Committee to support Bill 39 as this provides a measure of support towards those critically impacted by construction and demolition landfilling on O'ahu.

Aloha Chair Cordero, Vice-Chair Weyer, and Members of the Committee,

My name is T. George Paris and I have been a resident of Nanakuli for over 50 years and have lived near PVT ever since it was built in our backyard. I <u>strongly support</u> Bill 39, CD1 (2023), which establishes a real property tax exemption for certain real property located near an active landfill. This bill will help benefit hundreds of union members from all different sectors who are suffering from many different ailments from living near a construction and demolition waste landfill. I also strongly urge the Council to keep the radius at **1 mile** to help the residents of Nanakuli who have suffered for decades.

The reality is, for nearly 40 years, since 1985, residents of Nanakuli saw PVT move into their backyard and have suffered the ill effects of the PVT Landfill such as chronic respiratory ailments or cancer that have unfortunately caused many loved ones to die earlier than they should have. In fact, residents living near PVT have a 10-year lower life expectancy compared to the state average according to the data collected by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the National Center for Health Statistics Neighborhood Life Expectancy Project which was released publicly in 2018. And this is no coincidence. Homes, schools, and churches surround the PVT Landfill which emits harmful particles into the air which many residents have no idea they are breathing in. Nanakuli residents from the day they are born suffer from the many hazards of a landfill with many tragically dying at a younger age including my wife Violet Sunday Paris who died at a young age of 72 while living near PVT. It is important the Mayor takes action to correct the **environmental racism and injustice** that has blatantly occurred on the west side of Oahu.

That said, Bill 39 is a good start, which exempts residential real property taxes within one mile surrounding the PVT Landfill. These small property tax savings will help many of the residents who suffered and continue to suffer to this day. The fact is residents living within a mile of the operation of PVT are living paycheck-to-paycheck with a **majority living on Hawaiian Home Lands**. A real property tax break will bring about meaningful change and opportunity for those residents to better care for their health and safety, including through purchasing and maintaining air filters in their homes.

We need to remember that every community has the right to breathe clean air and as a matter of Hawaii Law, every community deserves a "clean and healthful environment" (HI State Const, Art. XI, Sec. 9). While Bill 39 does not close PVT, it does help Nanakuli residents better achieve the clean and healthful environment of the Hawaii State Constitution and recognizes <u>environmental racism and</u>

<u>injustice</u> has occurred throughout the west side of Oahu, especially near the PVT Landfill. It is also important to stress that PVT landfill should close in the next 5-7 years and help accomplish no more landfills on the west side of Oahu.

Will families also be covered for tax exemption relief and be warned of the dangerous accusations coming from the landfill? If it claims to be so dangerous of illness, why are we building new home ownership right across the street from PVT Landfill?

I'm a long-time resident of the Leeward side of the island. My ohana and I strongly support Bill 39, CD1, which exempts the property taxes for homes within a mile of a construction and demolition landfill.

Bill 39 CD1 addresses environmental racism on the west side of Oahu. For too long, Nanakuli residents have been forgotten and have dealt with the negative effects of a landfill surrounding their properties, schools, and shopping centers.

It is believed that residents living near PVT live on average 10 years less than the state average with many dealing with respiratory illnesses and cancer. This is wrong and we are glad Bill 39 will financially help those suffering from the many illnesses caused by PVT landfill near their homes. Ultimately, PVT needs to close but until a new site is found, residents should be financially compensated. Bill 39 CD1 is a step in the right direction.

Data collected by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the National Center for Health Statistics Neighborhood Life Expectancy Project show that residents living near the PVT landfill live an average of 10 years less than the state average with many dealing with respiratory illnesses, health problems and cancer. I <u>STRONGLY SUPPORT</u> BILL 39(2023), CD1: which establishes a real property tax exemption for residences within 1 mile of the PVT Landfill.

At the 2023 Legislature, the State House (HCR107) and State Senate (SCR57) both passed concurrent resolutions which support a real property tax exemption around an active landfill.

For years, residents who live around the PVT Landfill have testified that their health and the health of their families have been adversely affected by the PVT Landfill. Many have developed respiratory ailments and many have sadly died at a young age of cancer.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention/National Center for Health Statistics Neighborhood Life Expectancy Project, residents in the two census tracts next to the PVT Landfill, live 10 years less than the state average of 82 years, being the 2nd and 3rd lowest life expectancies in the entire state. This validates the personal testimonies residents have made over the years.

In support of Bill 39, we have gotten hundreds of signatures on a petition, mostly from residents who live within 1 mile of PVT. In discussions at their doors, many shared more tragic stories about the adverse affects PVT has had on their families. I have attached copies of the petitions.

Residents of Nanakuli have been victims of environmental injustice, They have had to live with the PVT Landfill since 1986. Bill 39 is a start to compensate residents for the years of injustice.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local Union 1186 (IBEW 1186), is comprised of over 3,600 men and women working in electrical construction, telecommunications, Spectrum, civil service, and educator and faculty associations.

Landfills are often controversial, yet are considered an unfortunate necessity with how we live and work, especially in an island community. IBEW 1186 regularly supports construction projects that will put our members to work, and provide for their families. This inevitably comes with the need to have proper facilities to handle construction waste – that unfortunate necessity.

For years, we have supported initiatives to administer waste programs such as H-Power's construction and expansion, and alternative methods of energy production like biomass and waste-to-energy plants. We want to be part of the solution to our waste and energy needs, even if this includes evaluating better locations for landfills.

One thing has been clear in the process of searching for additional landfill locations is that "Nobody wants it In My Back Yard". This is understandable with studies that argue health risks and property devaluation for those living near landfills. This opposition, however, does not change the fact that we need to continue to do better at managing our waste with the finite and limited space of our islands.

We solemnly recognize that our members, friends, and families of Nanakuli have had a landfill in-their-backyard for decades. BILL 39 CD1 does not proport to have all the answers for our waste needs, but it does offer a small benefit, in the way of exempting property taxes, to the community that has taken in waste from every corner of Oahu.

Our State Legislature also recognized that the residents living near landfills are "disproportionately burdened", and adopted a concurrent resolution (HCR 107HD1 2023) urging the City and County of Honolulu to offer these real property tax savings to the impacted communities.

Consistent with the passage of Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) 57 of 2023: "Urging the City & County of Honolulu to exempt from real property tax those property owners of residential units within a specified distance from an active municipal solid waste landfill or construction and demolition landfill or deemed to have been impacted by an active landfill to a degree that warrants such an exemption." I submit this testimony in support of Bill 39.

The Wai'anae Coast and its population of Hawaiians have always shown to occupy the most concerning categories of all population demographic statistics. They have the lowest health outcomes, the highest disease rates, a disproportionate mental health issues, lowest incomes, etc. Now, the scientific consensus affirms what the communities of West O'ahu, especially Nānākuli, have been experiencing for decades, that landfills are an additional health hazard. No one should suffer the ill effects of landfills, so we need to decrease our reliance upon landfills and eventually stop using them altogether.

As we all endeavor to improve these abysmal statistics as soon as possible, there are some compensations we may wish to consider today with this bill. Hawai'i recognized that "no one segment of the population or geographic area should be disproportionately burdened with environmental and/or health impacts resulting from. Many of those living in proximity of the operation of an active landfill are living paycheck to paycheck. A real property tax break will bring about meaningful change and opportunity for those residents to better care for their health and safety, including through purchasing and maintaining air filters in their houses.

The people of West O'ahu, especially those living within a specified distance of the active operation of Oahu's landfills, have borne the brunt of our island's collective waste. Please consider providing some relief and compensation for those who have been sacrificing so much for so long. We have an opportunity to address the negative impacts and consequences.

Aloha Chair Cordero and Councilmembers,

Thank you for allowing testimony on Bill 39 (2023), CD1 and the proposed CD2. The bill and proposed CD2 would allow a real property tax exemption for certain properties within a certain distance from a landfill. (The CD2 clarifies that it would only apply to the PVT landfill.)

Exemptions cost us approximately \$180.4 million last fiscal year, and now you are considering adding more. This lost revenue has to be borne by someone, because every year the budget goes up, not down, and those taxpayers tend to be everyone except homeowners who are fortunate enough to live in their own homes.

You're going the wrong way – exemptions should be removed and reduced, not expanded.

In addition, it seems the real property tax "reform" that was mentioned several months ago was simply talk. While a resolution for a permitted interaction group has been introduced, it still has not been assigned a committee.

As a side note, we should be reducing the amount of construction material that is discarded. One way to do so would be to dig up only as much roadway as necessary when repairing or replacing pipes or utilities.

On Lunalilo Home Road, for example, when the Board of Water Supply replaced a major water pipe several years ago, they had to dig up about 4 to 5 feet of recently-paved roadway. Instead of limiting the amount of pavement removal to that width, however, they scraped off almost 8.5 feet with the additional amount removed to a depth of about 4 to 5 inches. When I asked about this, I was told it was done that way, because the minimum width of equipment the contractor had was about 8 feet. I was also told this larger equipment didn't add to the cost of the job, but it did add to the amount of construction material that had to go somewhere. (Note, I do not know whether any of it was recycled.)

# Bill 39 | Landfill Real Property Tax

Dear City Council,

CARES testifies wishing to comment.

#### **Introduction**

The purpose of Bill 39 is to establish a real property tax exemption for certain real property located near an active landfill. Integrated Solid Waste Management Facility operated by PVT Land Company Ltd is the only construction and demolition debris landfill available for public use in the City. In the City's 2019 Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan Update, it states that the amount of construction and demolition debris generated in the City has increased over the years, due in part to the impacts of the HART project.

The Waimanalo Gulch Sanitary Landfill is currently the City's only permitted public municipal solid waste landfill, with special permit use approved from State Land Use Commission. Oahu's municipal solid waste goes to WGSL. City may use WGSL until March 2, 2028. City must identify new trash site and close operations. Trash site is being identified & evaluated to contain construction debris & solid waste. New trash sites is critically important to real property tax exemption for residents in close proximity to the new facilities as to provide reasonable incentive for local homeowners.

It is critically important to match the definitions of the City & State policies. It is also critically important to review the regulations from the State law because the State provides the special permit to the City for operating the municipal trash site. Let's explore this matter further.

  "Person" means any individual, partnership, firm, association, public or private corporation, federal agency, the State or any of its political subdivisions, trust, estate, or any other legal ty.

  "Pollution" means solid waste pollution.
  "Recycling" means the collection, separation, recovery, and sale or reuse of secondary resources that would otherwise be disposed of as municipal solid waste, and is an integral part of a acturing process aimed at producing a marketable product made of postconsumer material.
  "Sanitary landfill" means a land site on which engineering principles are utilized to bury deposits of solid waste without creating a nuisance or hazard to public health or safety.

The Hawaii State Law defines "sanitary landfills" in HRS 342 H-1. This chapter is the Solid Waste Pollution Chapter in Title 19 of the Health section. This Title 19 talks about DOH, medical research, medical facilities, smoking, poison, marijuana, E waste, hazardous waste and solid waste pollution.

#### HRS 342 H 1 - Definitions:

"Sanitary landfill" means a land site on which engineering principles are utilized to bury deposits of solid waste without creating a nuisance or hazard to public health or safety.

"Solid waste" means garbage, refuse, and other discarded materials, including solid, liquid, semisolid, or contained gaseous materials resulting from industrial, commercial, mining, and agricultural operations, sludge from waste treatment plants and water supply treatment plants, and residues from air pollution control facilities and community activities, but does not include solid or dissolved materials in domestic sewage or other substances in water sources such as silt, dissolved or suspended solids in industrial waste water effluents, dissolved materials in irrigation return flows, or other common water pollutants, or source, special nuclear, or by-product material as defined by the federal Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended (68 Stat. 923).

**"Solid waste management system"** means a system for the storage, processing, treatment, transfer, or disposal of solid waste.

"Waste" means sewage, industrial and agricultural matter, and all other liquid, gaseous, or solid substance, including radioactive substance, whether treated or not, which may pollute or tend to pollute the atmosphere, lands or waters of this State.

HRS 342H -51 Municipal Solid Waste Landfill Criteria describes the city's landfill criterias. The City must get a special permit from the State Land Use Commission to operate the landfill.

HRS 342H-51 "Municipal solid waste landfill unit" means a discrete area of land or an excavation that receives household waste and is not a land application unit, surface impoundment, injection well, or waste pile. A municipal solid waste landfill unit also may receive other types of waste regulated under <u>Subtitle D of RCRA</u> (EPA), such as commercial solid waste, nonhazardous sludge, small quantity generator waste and industrial solid waste. Such a landfill may be publicly or privately owned. A municipal solid waste landfill unit may be a new municipal solid waste landfill unit, an existing municipal solid waste landfill unit, or a lateral expansion.

#### **RCRA**

Subtitle D of RCRA is managed from the EPA. RCRA stands for "Resource Conservation and Recovery Act". RCRA establishes the framework for a national system of solid waste control. Subtitle D of the Act is dedicated to non-hazardous solid waste requirements, and Subtitle C focuses on hazardous solid waste. Solid waste includes solids, liquids and gasses and must be discarded to be considered waste.

Figure 1-1 shows the development plan areas that the Honolulu Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) uses when it collects and analyzes demographic data. The DPP projects change in each of the development plan areas; the projections shown in Table 1-2 indicate that, during the planning period, the resident population is expected to continue to be concentrated on the southern half of the island, with the highest growth rate expected in Ewa.

Although the DPP does not provide the de facto population by development plan area, it does project growth in visitor accommodation units. The projections suggest that visitor accommodations will continue to be concentrated in the Primary Urban Center, in addition to significant resident population growth in Ewa.<sup>3</sup> The Ewa plan area is therefore likely to experience stronger growth in waste and recyclable quantities than other parts of the island.

On page 20 & 21 of the 2019 Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan, "DPP projects change in each of the development plan areas; the projections shown in Table 1-2 indicate that, during the planning period, the resident population is expected to continue to be concentrated on the southern half of the island, with the highest growth rate expected in Ewa.

During the planning period, the resident population is expected to continue to be concentrated on the souther half of the island, with the highest growth rate expected in Ewa. The Ewa plan area is therefore likely to experience stronger growth in waste & recyclable quantities than other districts.

There are a lot of variables in this subject matter. One must get all the facts before proceeding. For a truly "integrated plan", there must be more coordination & collaboration with the State.
