## In consideration of Bill 59 (23) CD 1 Proposed A BILL RELATING TO INCENTIVES FOR FILM STUDIO FACILITIES.

Honorable Chair Cordero and members of the Honolulu City Council Committee on Budget.

The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT) and its Creative Industries Division (CID) supports Bill 59 (23), CD1, which seeks to establish incentives to develop purpose-built facilities for film production within the City and County of Honolulu on a minimum of 10 acres at a minimum development cost of \$100,000,000.

From 2018 through 2022, the film production industry has steadily reached \$400 million in production spend, with an estimated economic impact over \$700 million. hiring over 4,000 residents per year over the five-year period. Film production can only grow beyond this metric if new facilities are developed, and we increase our skilled workforce.

In addition to these elements, maintaining the Hawai'i Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit (HRS 235-17) is crucial and provides a foundation for the growth of the infrastructure and talent necessary to accelerate our \$400M industry into a billion-dollar film industry for our state.


In CD1, Section 3, the exemption for assessed building value is further defined, providing requirements which align with the elements necessary to build a thriving film and media industry for our state.

We note in Section 3 the language requiring <u>internships or other paid positions</u> on a production are to be done in partnership with the production company leasing the space. <u>This would also need to extend such approvals to the production's studios or networks and film industry labor unions which have jurisdiction over those craft areas.</u>

DBEDT's work with our community sector partnerships through UH Good Jobs Hawai'i and Good Jobs Oahu, is focused on increasing our workforce in these creative sectors so students and residents can build film industry careers while remaining here at home.

This measure is an important catalyst for facilities and therefore industry growth. The department looks forward to working with the Council and Office of the Mayor to advance Bill 59, CD1 (23), and incentivize the development of new infrastructure with the mutual goal of expanding our City and County and State film ecosystem.

Aloha Chair Cordero and Members of the Committee,

MAHALO for the opportunity to provide testimony in <u>SUPPORT of BILL 59</u>. The IATSE is the largest entertainment union in the world, and Local 665 represents nearly 800 members and 700 trainees who work behind the scenes in film, television, live events and tradeshows across the Hawaiian Islands.

Bill 59 would incentivize the construction of a full-fledged film studio on O'ahu. This would make Hawai'i more competitive with other film locales, diversify and grow our economy, create small businesses and bring new revenue to the City and County.

"NCIS – Hawai'i" is a large television series and has occupied the Diamond Head Studio (DHS) for the past two years where they are limited to three stages. When "Magnum P.I." was canceled last year, "NCIS- Hawai'i" took over the Kalaeloa Stages, indicating their need for more space. The Kalaeloa Stages were vacant military buildings that have been retrofitted into film stages, but they lack soundproofing and stage space that a proper film studio would provide.

For the past 20 years, the Diamond Head Studio has had a reliable tenant every year, bringing consistent revenue to the State. From 2004 – 2010, the ABC TV series, "Lost" was based there, then CBS's reboot of "Hawai'i Five-O" and "Magnum P.I." moved in, and it is now home to "NCIS – Hawai'i." It seems that once a major studio occupies the DHS, they try very hard to keep it occupied, and I foresee that happening to the new film studio as well. "If you build it, they will come."

In 2021, a huge town of exterior facades were built for a movie, but the company built interior sets on stages on the mainland and shot there for several months after leaving Hawai'i. Had we interior stage space for them to use, there would have been more local film workers hired to build the sets, and the company would have extended their stay by several months, equating to more money spent in the county and state.

The longer a show stays here, the more predictable income becomes and the more stable families become. A long-running television series is as close to full-time employment as one can get in the film industry, lasting as long as nine months out of the year. Multiple concurrent television shows as we have enjoyed recently are ideal for training and growth.



Television series love filming our beautiful scenery and landscapes and need interior stage space to film on rainy days, when locations cannot accommodate the size of the company or the interior location is unsuitable.

In mainland cities where stages have been built, a microcosm of ancillary businesses is often created. For instance, in Atlanta, GA, a hardware store, hotel, eateries, grocery stores and other businesses were built to accommodate the growing film community. We can expect, and should plan for, similar growth near our new film studio.

Of course, the Building Trades Union workers would benefit by constructing the facility.

### The economic impact by the film industry is compelling:

- employs several hundred Hawai'i members and residents per show.
- sustains thousands of creative sector jobs
- provides millions of dollars in economic impact for the state.
- In 2021, the industry spent \$421 million in estimated production expenditures, generated an estimated \$728 million of economic impact, \$45.5 million in estimated tax revenues, and total job impacts of 4180 jobs.

There are many benefits to supporting the building of a new film studio, and the timing of this bill is critical. The State has created educational and training opportunities for the film industry at UH-Manoa and UH-West Oahu, and we need to provide jobs for these new graduates or we will be educating and training someone else's work force because they will need to go where the work is.

Dear Chair Cordero and members of the Honolulu City Council:

Our names are Aaron and Jordan Kandell, and we are Oahu born, raised, and still based professional screenwriters and producers of films that include "Adrift" and Disney's "Moana".

We also work actively with local organizations and schools who share our mission and commitment to help nurture, support, and expand opportunities and access for emerging talent in the Hawaiian film and tv industry. These include serving as mentors and judges for Ohina Labs and the Hawaii International Film Festival (Jordan just joined their board); and as guest teachers at public schools in the DOE, private high schools, and The School of Cinematic Arts @ UH Manoa (where we also serve on the advisory board).

### We are writing in support of the proposed CD1 of Bill 59 (2023).

We grew up with dreams of pursuing a career as storytellers and filmmakers in a time when there was little to no opportunities in Hawaii for mentorship, education, or on-set experience. Like every other aspirant of our generation (and those that proceeded us), we had to leave the islands for film school, internships, and early career networking and job opportunities. That historic brain-drain of our creative community has reversed in the last 15 years with the creation of the ACM system and successful tax incentive programs. All of which have boosted local production and job opportunities for film students and professionals at every level.

## Bill 59, CD1 will further boost this burgeoning branch of the Hawaiian economy and community.

By paving the way for the construction of physical production stages and facilities, this bill will build the resource Hawaii most lacks and thus limits future film/TV industry growth. Other testimony to this bill directly address the significant, positive and widespread economic impact film/tv productions bring to our islands. We will focus ours instead on personal experiences where lack of a film facility lost us chances to bring big budget productions to our island home.

1. In 2018 we hard-fought to film our \$30 million movie "Adrift" on Oahu and neighboring islands. Locations, experienced crews, and tax incentives were ultimately not enough for our production's needs, which required a single soundstage that wasn't available here. For this reason alone, we were forced to take our production to New Zealand and Fiji.

- 2. Similarly in 2019, we were gearing up to produce a \$50 million film about the Massie Affair to be directed by Clint Eastwood and distributed by Warner Brothers. A true story, we championed, should be filmed in full on the island it historically occurred. Again, due to lack of available stages/facilities, our production plan was forced to pivot to filming half on a stage on the mainland, with exteriors only on Oahu (before covid indefinitely paused this project).
- 3. In 2020, M. Night Shymalan's producing partner reached out to us during prep on the film "Old" (\$18 million budget), hoping to film completely in Hawaii. But due to lack of a suitable soundstage and production facilities, they relocated to the Dominican Republic.
- 4. For 2024 we are hoping once again to film an empowering Hawaii set story 100% in Hawaii, with Hawaiian talent and Hawaiian crews. Again we find ourselves faced with the same hurdle: the lack of available production facilities for our mid to high-budget film.

These are just four personal examples in the last 5 years from local born and based producers. We have heard from a host of other producer-friends in the industry who have faced the same issue in their desire and efforts to bring more productions to the islands.

<u>Bill 59, CD1 is a solution to this bottleneck</u>. A state of the art film facility, with stages and post production offices, will exponentially increase our ability to meet growing demand. To bring, we hope, not just big hollywood and international productions to the islands, but also to help support important, diverse stories and storytellers.

One testimony in opposition has cited Atlanta as a cautionary tale of the extractive potential of Hollywood. We urge this committee to consider the success of places like New Zealand: where government supported film industry and infrastructure have helped advance a renaissance in Maori culture/community through vibrant, ever expanding local productions.

This is what we most support in Bill 59, CD1: that a film facility must support our local industry through paid internships, workforce development, access, and incentives for local filmmakers. If anything we encourage clearer, more specific language around these requirements, which must be met in order to ensure a film studio will become an additive vs extractive resource. To quote *Field of Dreams:* "If you build it, they will come." This bill goes further, ensuring "they" includes diverse storytellers who call Hawaii home. It has the potential to be a lighthouse for other cities, counties, states, and nations for how to support an industry in ways that sustain and uplift opportunities for all involved.
