BILL 59 Proposed FD(2023) – RELATED TO INCENTIVES FOR FILM STUDIO FACILITIES

Chair Cordero, Vice Chair Weyer, Members of the Committee,

My name is Chris Lee. Thank you for the opportunity to testify today as a private citizen. I write today in support for Council Member Augie Tulbas proposed Floor Draft for Bill 59.

I greatly appreciated everyone on this Council in their support for our production industry and their careful consideration and contributions to Bill 59. A major studio complex is an essential component to growing this vital diversification of our economy.

But, as UHERO Economist Sumner LaCroix noted in his previous testimony on Bill 59, "the bottom line is that no large production facility of this magnitude is built in the United States today without significant tax credits being awarded by a state or local government."

Sumner LaCroix and fellow UHERO economist Professor Emeritus James Mak have previously written on the role of the Hawai'i TV/film/digital production tax credit in diversifying the Hawai'i economy. According to their research, "since the passage of the Act 88 film credit in 2006, spending in Hawai'i on TV/film productions has soared, with inflation-adjusted spending increasing by 116 percent between 2007 (\$164.5 million) and 2019 (\$355.6 million).

This is much larger than the overall increase in Hawai'i real gross domestic product over the same period, a modest 17 percent." Before Act 88, Hawaii never saw more than \$100 million in production per year. Since then, our industry has climbed to a DBEDT reported average of \$396 million dollars in direct spend per annum.

In 2022, the latest figures from DBEDT, the total Hawai'i film production direct spend was \$420.04 million (includes qualified tax credit spend and non-tax credit spend). The breakdown by island is as follows:

O'ahu: \$354.88 million

Hawai'i County: \$39.32 million Kaua'i County: \$12.56 million Maui County: \$13.28 million

With Hawai'i household income generated at \$168.02 million and tax revenue generation of \$45.36 million, DBEDT estimates the total economic impact from film production on our economy at an impressive \$726.68 million.

As with all industries, growth depends on three factors: workforce development, physical infrastructure and incentives.

Workforce development has been accomplished in part by the statewide expansion of the Academy for Creative Media System (ACM System) which has developed or enhanced educational programs across the entire UH System.

Currently, the state offers various levels of production incentives throughout the islands with an annual cap of \$50 million.

The City and County of Honolulu, as noted above, enjoys the vast majority of revenue driven by the production industry. But Oahu is physically capped by the lack of stage space -- with only one stage at Diamond Head, and the makeshift WW2 hangars at Kalaeloa presently serving only one show, *NCIS*, and the very limited City-leased facility in Kakaako.

The Floor Draft for Bill 59 offers Honolulu our best chance to propel Honolulu into a true production hub. A privately owned studio complex with a minimum of \$100 million investment and on a minimum of ten acres would allow multiple shows to shoot at the same time and for major films like *Jumanji*, *Pirates of the Caribbean*, *Midway*, *Chief of War* and *Jurassic Park* to complete all of their filming here rather than just shooting exteriors then moving to Atlanta, London, Los Angeles or Montreal for their stage work. This is potentially hundreds of millions of dollars in direct spend that we are currently losing.

BILL 59, CD2 – RELATED TO INCENTIVES FOR FILM STUDIO FACILITIES

Chair Cordero, Vice Chair Weyer, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Sumner La Croix, and I am Professor Emeritus in the UH-Mānoa Economics Dept and a Senior Research Fellow at the University of Hawai'i Economic Research Organization (UHERO). I am testifying today in a private capacity and my views do not necessarily reflect those of UH-Mānoa or UHERO.

I testified in favor of Bill 59 at the 24 January 2024 Council hearing.

Since then, Bill 59 has been amended to require that the new studio meet three additional conditions to receive the property tax exemption: (1) a minimum number of employees at the start of business operations; (2) the State of Hawai'i grants a GET exemption for the cost of all construction materials used to build the studio; and (3) the facility must also qualify for a tax incentive from the State, such as a motion picture, digital media, or film production income tax credit.

All three conditions are designed to "raise the bar" for a new film studio to receive a property tax exemption from the City and County of Honolulu. They go against the basic rationale for the property tax exemption: To increase the likelihood that a major film studio will decide to locate in Honolulu.

I urge the Council to remove these three conditions from Bill 59 as they reduce the expected value of the tax exemption to a film studio and decrease the likelihood that a major film studio will locate in Honolulu.

My name is Kiran Polk, and I am the Executive Director of the Kapolei Chamber of Commerce. The Kapolei Chamber is an advocate for businesses in the Kapolei region which includes Waipahu to Ka'ena Point. The Chamber works on behalf of its members and the entire business community to improve the regional and state economic climate and help Kapolei businesses thrive. We are a member- driven, member-supported organization representing the interests of all types of business: small, medium or large, for profit or non-profit businesses or sole proprietorship.

The Kapolei Chamber is in <u>strong support</u> of <u>Bill 59(2023) CD1</u>, and proposed CD2 which would provide real property tax incentives for the dedication of real property for eligible film studio facilities.

The Kapolei Chamber of Commerce has prioritized the effort to support the establishment of a film studio in West O'ahu. One of the priorities of the Business Revitalization Task Force is to "Advocate for job growth in digital media, film production and technology industries in West O'ahu."

This measure will provide the needed incentives to grow a billion-dollar industry here in Hawai'i.

According to the Motion Picture Association, the film and television industry is directly responsible for more than 3,630 jobs in the Islands, which includes more than \$192 million in wages statewide. Hawai'i's Motion Picture, Digital Media and Film Production Income Tax Credit production reports data indicates that local hires are at 80% on average, if not higher.

A film studio would only bring revenue into O'ahu county, it will provide an opportunity for our students to stay here in Hawai'i making a living wage and provide an opportunity for Hawai'i residents to return home. **There are opportunities to employ Hawai'i people across a range of sectors, from construction, catering, costuming, camera, post-production, and beyond.** We also believe that West O'ahu provides the ideal location for a film studio, with the University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu's Academy of Creative Media establishing just a couple of years ago. The measure also supports providing internships for our future workforce which is also essential to grow this industry.

More jobs, specifically living wage, professional jobs are needed on the west side to keep pace with the population growth in West Oʻahu. Decades ago, the City and County of Honolulu adopted a goal of creating a "Second City" and moving residential and economic growth toward West Oʻahu. West Oʻahu's growing population of almost 200,000 includes the Waiʻanae Coast, `Ewa, and Waipahu. In Kapolei and `Ewa alone households are expected to exceed 56,000 by the year 2035 and over the next 30 years the population in Kapolei and `Ewa will increase by 40 percent and housing by 52 percent.

We believe the incentives for job growth, especially in West O'ahu are warranted and needed. We also specifically support job growth in film production on the west side including the incentives so greatly needed to support the effort.

Aloha Chair Cordero and Members of the Committee,

MAHALO for the opportunity to provide testimony in **SUPPORT of BILL 59**.

My name is Irish Barber, and I am the Business Representative of IATSE Local 665. The IATSE is the largest entertainment union in the world, and Local 665 represents nearly 800 members and 700 trainees who work behind the scenes in film, television, live events and tradeshows across the Hawaiian Islands.

Bill 59 is extremely important to Hawai'i's film industry because it incentivizes the building of a full-fledged film facility with stage spaces, offices, warehouse storage and parking. Shows that occupy a film facility use that location as a base to work out of. It is easier to collaborate when all of the workers and equipment are all located on one property rather than have them split up around the island as productions often do when stage space is unavailable.

LONG-TERM INCOME

The film industry typically has sporadic work, making for an unpredictable livelihood for film workers. Shows that stay in Hawai'i for long periods of time, such as television series, can run for nine months out of the year and renew year after year, creating nearly full-time employment for hundreds of workers. Having several shows running simultaneously helps us to train up additional workers and provide reliable income to Hawai'i families.

PRIVATE SECTOR JOBS

Companies that support the film industry also benefit as they typically hire additional W-2 employees, creating jobs in the private sector and providing tax revenue and millions of dollars in economic impact for the city and state. Of course, the Building Trades Union workers would benefit by constructing the facility.

ECONOMIC IMPACT

In 2021, the industry spent \$421 million in estimated production expenditures, generated an estimated \$728 million of economic impact, \$45.5 million in estimated tax revenues, and total job impacts of 4180 jobs.



GLOBAL COMPETITION

Hawai'i is the most remote landmass on the planet and has an extremely high cost of living. Getting here and staying here can be expensive. We have lost many film jobs to other less-expensive locations, so having a strong tax incentive and another film facility would make Hawai'i more competitive with other film locales.

In mainland cities where stages have been built, a microcosm of ancillary businesses is often created. For instance, in Atlanta, GA, a hardware store, hotel, eateries, grocery stores and other businesses were built to accommodate the growing film community. We can expect, and should plan for, similar growth near our new film studio.

In 2021, a huge town of exterior facades was built for a movie, but the company built interior sets on stages on the mainland and shot there for several months after leaving Hawai'i. Had we interior stage space for them to use, there would have been more local film workers hired to build the sets, and the company would have extended their stay by several months, equating to more money spent in the county and state.

CONSISTENT USE OF CURRENT FILM FACILITIES

"NCIS – Hawai'i" is a large television series and has occupied the Diamond Head Studio (DHS) for the past two years where they are limited to three stages. When "Magnum P.I." was canceled last year, "NCIS- Hawai'i" took over the Kalaeloa Stages, indicating their need for more space. The Kalaeloa Stages were vacant military buildings that have been retrofitted into film stages, but they lack soundproofing and stage space that a proper film studio would provide.

For the past 20 years, the Diamond Head Studio has had a reliable tenant every year, bringing consistent revenue to the State. From 2004 – 2010, the ABC TV series, "Lost" was based there, then CBS's reboot of "Hawai'i Five-O" and "Magnum P.I." moved in, and it is now home to "NCIS – Hawai'i." It seems that once a major studio occupies the DHS, they try very hard to keep it occupied, and I foresee that happening to the new film studio as well. "If you build it, they will come."

Film workers are only employed when the movie occupies the facility. Otherwise, only a few people are needed to manage or maintain the property when it is vacant.

SUPPORTING HAWAI'I'S CURRENT FILM INDUSTRY GROWTH

There are many benefits to supporting the building of a new film studio, and the timing of this bill is critical. The State has created educational and training opportunities for the film industry at UH-Manoa and UH-West Oahu, and we need to provide jobs for these new graduates or we will be educating and training someone else's work force because they will need to go where the work is.

I support the development of studios and other infrastructure programs that support local filmmakers and the creative industries. I urge the Council to <u>SUPPORT BILL 59</u>.

Film and television production has been a cornerstone of our island economy for decades. It has also enjoyed a synergistic relationship with our largest industry: tourism. Film production directly funnels into our visitor industry product. All who are involved in the production process support local businesses by staying in our hotels, shopping at our retail stores, and dining at our restaurants.

In essence, film and television productions not only showcase the timeless beauty and natural allure of our islands, but also do so with minimal or no cost to the public. This approach simultaneously fosters an environment that encourages other productions, including those from Asia, to view Hawai'i as a captivating backdrop for their projects.

Before assuming my role as the Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT), I had already recognized the robust appeal of film production as a clean and dynamic industry for a multitude of reasons. It not only generates employment opportunities for a wide range of professions, including local directors, actors, film crew, and caterers, but also serves as a catalyst for luring people to the islands and driving revenue for local businesses over extended periods. During my tenure at DBEDT, we dedicated substantial efforts to attract television series such as "One West Waikiki" and "Byrds of Paradise" to the state. Upon assuming the role of councilmember and later as the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, my commitment to local productions grew stronger. Local productions offer our residents the chance to showcase their talents and creativity while bolstering the industry's development. During that period, the Teamsters Union reached out to me to work with the State of Hawai'i to bring "Baywatch" to our islands. Throughout my tenure as both councilmember and Mayor, the city's film office actively supported the production of the longstanding hit series, "LOST."

We have always been noted for having talent of the highest caliber in Hawai'i which includes local born filmmakers such as Chris Lee, Edgy Lee, and others. In 2022, Chris noted that the economic benefits

related to film production in Hawai'i amounted to approximately \$482 million, with roughly 70% of that money spent on O'ahu. Consider the substantial growth potential of the industry if we were to establish more than a single film studio.

The State of Hawai'i currently has a sole film studio near Diamond Head; however, the constraints of this facility can pose challenges for productions seeking to work within the state. Offering financial incentives to private developers for constructing film facilities would not only broaden our production infrastructure but also facilitate increased participation of filmmakers and TV productions in Hawai'i.

Furthermore, aligning with our organization's dedication to workforce development, we commend the bill for emphasizing the collaboration between the film studio facility and local colleges, universities, or vocational schools for internship programs. This strategic initiative is indispensable for sustaining our competitiveness and ensuring valuable job opportunities for our kama'āina.

The passage of **Bill 59 (2023) Proposed CD2** would be a significant step forward in letting the film and media world know that we welcome them to the Hawaiian Islands. For these reasons, we urge you to pass this measure through committee.

Honorable Budget Chair Cordero and members of the Honolulu City Council.

The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT) and its Creative Industries Division (CID) supports Bill 59 (23), which further refines the scope and requirements for an incentive to develop purpose-built facilities for film production within the City and County of Honolulu on a minimum of 10 acres at a minimum development cost of \$100,000,000.

We concur with the changes proposed in sections and concur with the requirements to work in concert with the Hawai'i Film Office in Creative Industries to support the workforce development components. DBEDT calls to your attention the new section requirement for the state to exempt the cost of all construction materials used for the development of the film studio facility would be exempt from the State of Hawaii general excise tax.

Please note that Governor Green has introduced <u>HB 2360</u> and <u>SB 3049</u> related to Film Industry Development this Legislative session. These measures, along with <u>SB 3285</u> contain a proposed section for an Infrastructure Credit as part of HRS 235-17, the Motion Picture, Digital Media, Film Production Income Tax Incentive, specifically to incentivize facilities and infrastructure development <u>through an exemption of general</u> excise tax for construction costs associated with any new or retrofit studio development.

These measures compliment Bill 59 (2023) which seek to provide the necessary incentives to drive infrastructure development to grow our film industry. We do caution that the language that requires the state to forgo GET is not necessary as this is already a position the Administration has taken.

We thank the council for their contirbutions to Bill 59 and support its passage. This measure introduces a City and County of Honolulu mechanism for infrastructure growth and with that, helps to leverage our film tax credit to accelerate our \$400M industry into a billion-dollar film industry for our state.

BILL 59 Proposed CD2 (2023) – RELATED TO INCENTIVES FOR FILM STUDIO FACILITIES

Chair Cordero, Vice Chair Weyer, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony on this issue. The University of Hawai'i (UH) previously provided testimony in support of Bill 59 CD1, which would provide added incentives for eligible film studio facilities. The University has concerns with additional amendments included in Bill 59 Proposed CD2.

There are three amendments in Bill 59 Proposed CD2 that are of particular concern to the University: 1) a requirement to have a minimum of 100 or more full-time employees; 2) a requirement that the cost of all construction materials to build the film studio be exempt from the State's General Excise Tax; and 3) a requirement that the film studio must qualify for a tax incentive from the State, such as a motion picture, digital media, or film production income tax credit.

While the University would not benefit directly from the proposed incentives, the incentives in Bill 59 would create an attractive benefit to eligible private film studio developers or businesses. The three additions that have been added to Bill 59 Proposed CD2 could be more cumbersome or complicated to the point that they may not be implementable. The University is currently in the process of trying to find a developer of vacant UH real estate for a film studio that would benefit the state, and industry. It is not clear whether the above provisions are too onerous or even applicable for the University's particular development. In making University land available for a film studio, the University has supported economic development and business sustainability of film studio facilities in the State. Thank you for your consideration of our testimony.

The Film and Digital Media industry employs hundreds of Hawaii Local members, sustains thousands of creative sector jobs, and provides millions of dollars in economic impact for the State. The Hawaii Department of Economic Development, Business, and Tourism, reports that in the 2021 calendar year, the industry spent \$421 million in estimated production expenditures, generated an estimated \$728 million of economic impact, \$45.5 million in estimated tax revenues, and total job impacts of 4,180 jobs. However, we have hit a plateau, partly because we do not have the infrastructure (studio space) to support substantial further growth.

We support incentives that encourage investment in the building of and maintaining film studios on the island.

SAG-AFTRA supports robust and fair incentive programs. Bill 59 as amended by a proposed CD2, would contribute to 1) the diversification of our local economy; 2) creating more living wage and union jobs, and 3) bringing more revenue to creative industry-focused businesses, and many other businesses that are adjacent to and/or auxiliary to the creative industries. The Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement (CNHA) writes in **strong support of Bill 59 and Councilmember's Tulba's proposed committee draft**. Economic diversification is necessary to improve the resilience of the state and self-determination of Native Hawaiians, and Bill 59 capitalizes on a massively underutilized industry.

For background, CNHA is a member-based 501(c)3 non-profit organization with a mission to enhance the cultural, economic, political, and community development of Native Hawaiians. We know firsthand the need for economic diversification to benefit our community.

Bill 59 has an enormous amount of potential for the pae 'āina. Perhaps most pressingly, it helps to diversify our economy. One of the most cited reasons for local residents leaving the islands is the lack of job prospectives, but this bill helps to remedy the problem by developing the local workforce.
