Councilmember Cordero stated that she hopes the Bill will go back to Committee so that further revenue enhancements can be made in addition to the proposed relief bills.

In response to Councilmember Weyer, Andrew Kawano, Director, Department of Budget and Fiscal Services stated that the increase in the credit could be \$4, \$5 million or more and it would depend on how many applications are received based on income.

Councilmember Weyer stated that the Department of Budget and Fiscal Services is not in support of having an area median income flat standard in the ordinance because it would be subject to the Department of Housing and Urban Development updating the number every year. He stated that this is not going to benefit low income families and adjustments need to be made constantly. Councilmember Weyer stated that if there is not going to be a formula then it will be hard to satisfy each individual family because each family is situated differently. He stated that the measure is one that he feels that is most responsive to families that may be struggling with the cost of living.

Councilmember Kia'āina stated that she looks forward to all of the measures going back to Committee to have a robust discussion. She stated that she believes that no one disagrees with the intent of the measure but there are fiscal impacts. Councilmember Kia'āina stated that she is concerned that looking at only one bill is not looking at the total picture.

Councilmember Tulba stated that he will be voting with reservations. He noted that he is in support of giving tax relief to homeowners who fall within the income but he is concerned about making sure that when property tax measures are passed, it is revenue neutral.

She noted her concerns as raised by the Department of Budget and Fiscal Services regarding the potential financial impact of the Bill particularly relating to application of the minimum property tax. Councilmember Kia'aina urged the Council to take a more measured approach to the tax amount that weighs the benefits against the potential financial impacts. She stated that she believes that a Permitted Interaction Group is needed to take a careful look at the various tax measures to ensure that the Council works together to benefit constituents and to take into account the anticipated impacts on revenues. Councilmember Kia'aina stated she looks forward to a robust discussion in Committee.

Councilmember Weyer stated that he recognizes some councilmembers have an idea of who should pay their fair share of property tax and who should be provided relief. He stated that he is open to generating revenue by other means which is why the Council is looking at and talking about the vacancy tax.

In response to councilmembers, Andrew Kawano, Director, Department of Budget and Fiscal Services (BFS) stated that:

- He received two e-mails and no documentation has been shared with BFS, and at this time they do not have enough information to recommend to move the measure forward. BFS would like to be able to understand what the obligations the City will have, what the administrative burden will be to carry out the program, and whether or not BFS will be held harmless if there are tax issues that need to be addressed with the Internal Revenue Service.
- The plan that is being presented looks and feels like the flex plan that the City currently has. He explained that the goal of the City’s plan is to spend everything that is put into the account and if it is not spent, the employee would lose it. With the CP Plus, BFS is not sure what happens to the remaining funds.
- The following are BFS’s concerns on CP Plus: 1) who will be responsible if not enough tax is withheld, 2) BFS would like to see a presentation on how the program works with one of their clients, 3) what is the City’s obligation, and is the City indemnified if something goes wrong.
- The program would need to go through the procurement process.
- There may be one or two Charter schools that have implemented this program.

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Councilmember Tupola stated that she saw a presentation from CP Plus multiple times and that the State of Hawai'i Organization of Police Officers and the Honolulu Police Department is in support of the program. She noted that if anything can be done to make the occupation more appealing for people to want to join would help. Councilmember Tupola stated that she also has not seen a demonstration which would be helpful.

Councilmember Weyer stated that there seems to be some misunderstanding on both sides and the Resolution encourages the conversation to continue. He noted that the program is a way to improve the quality of life for the police officers and believes that any opportunity to improve the quality of life for any City worker should be seriously looked at.

She noted that the City intends to convey the land to the DHHL to develop single-family homes for its native Hawaiian beneficiaries consistent with the character and scale of the current homes in the area. She expressed her commitment to the community that this is not a conveyance of the property, but authorizes due diligence efforts to see whether or not the City can convey the property, and all concerns will be taken into account. Councilmember Kia’aina urged councilmembers to support the measure.

In response to Councilmember Tupola, Kali Watson, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands stated that they would probably put out a request for qualification or request for proposal to identify a developer that would be best suited to do this type of development. He noted that before they can start the process, they will have to do their due diligence, analysis, investigations, and testing before coming to a conclusion.

Councilmember Tupola thanked Councilmember Kia’aina for taking all the comments and concerns to find a middle ground to help build Hawaiian homes and also appeasing all the community concerns.

Chair Waters stated that the Red Hill fuel tanks were built 83 ½ years ago during the time of martial law. He noted that the site remained classified until 1999 and is built 100 feet above the Waimalu Moanalua aquifer which supplies 77 percent of O'ahu's drinking water. He also noted that there are 70 plus documented leaks, estimated at 644,000 to 1.94 million gallons that may have leaked.

In response to councilmembers, Ernest Lau, Manager and Chief Engineer, Board of Water Supply (BWS) stated that:

- BWS is in support of third party independent testing which should follow BWS level of sensitivity that is done weekly. He would also like to require the military to conduct weekly tests for per- and polyfluroalkyl substances (PFAS), forever chemicals that were stored and used at Red Hill at all monitoring wells and new locations.
- The Red Hill Water Alliance Initiative report identified over one hundred different additional monitoring wells in the network which would be in addition to the thirty or forty that they already have.
- The additional wells in the northern part of Halawa Valley would be a variety of ownership-private, City, State and military property. The military concentrated on their property because they do not need permission to drill if it is on their own land.
- Once the source water protection plan study has been completed, BWS will present the study to the Council.
- He is pursuing information on current and formerly used defense sites or military installations where there is a vast concentration of wells in Central O'ahu, Waipahu, and Waipio which are the most productive wells in the system that taps the same sole source aquifer. He urged the military to be transparent.
- BWS has been doing 25,000 to 30,000 tests a year on water.

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- The Aiea Well was shut down in December 2021 in response to the Red Hill spills and contamination of the water system. BWS has been testing for polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAH), PFAS, and total petroleum hydrocarbons at the five closest wells around Red Hill.
- The Aiea Well is within a half mile of the Navy's Monitor Well No. 24 where PAH was detected in June. PAH is a family of chemicals that is found natural in fuel, coal, or oil and can also be created when you combust or burn things which can affect children being born and exposed to it.
- BWS informed the Environmental Protection Agency, the Department of Health, and the Navy by letter in early July indicating PAH was found and questioned if the plume of contamination was travelling with the groundwater.
- BWS will have to make a decision if they will shut down Kaamilo Well which is about a half mile to the West of Aiea Well or install a treatment system. They do not want to put the community at risk of having contaminants enter the water system.
- The Kaamilo Well provides almost a million gallons a day to the Aiea community.
- The Navy will not tell the BWS exactly how much fuel spilled; BWS asks the Navy to be transparent so that BWS will know what to do. BWS is concerned that leaks from the facility could migrate westward to the northwest where a lot of BWS wells are located that supply not only the Aiea Halawa community but the Honolulu water system.
- BWS would like the Navy to provide more monitor wells and perform more frequent testing for PFAS, PAH, and other chemicals at all locations.

Chair Waters stated that there has been a request for an amendment to the Resolution to allow for third party testing.

Councilmember Cordero stated that she would like to recommend that the two amendments from BWS also be included in the amendment.

At this juncture, Chair Waters moved Resolution 24-216 to the end of the calendar.
